KINGSTON SOCIETY TO HOLD BANQUET THIS EVENING.

J. McD. Mowat, vice-president of the society, will preside and act as toastmaster. Besides "The King," there will be only three toasts. Prof. W. L. Grant will respond for "Canada," Prof. W. B. Anderson for "Scotland," and Prof. John Dall, the chaplain of the society, for "The Day and A' Wee Honor." Piper J. W. Fraser will furnish the bagpipe music. There will also be a programme of song and story.
