BASKET BALL GAMES

QUEEN'S AND WHOLESALERS PLAYED TO A TIE.

The Score Was 33 to 33 After a Great Contest—Moore's Garage Team Easily Defeated St. James'.

There were big basketball games at the Y.M.C.A. gymnasium last evening which were witnessed by quite a large number of spectators who watched the clean manly playing all the way through with the greatest delight. Both games were fine exhibitions. The first was between the teams which represented St. James' and Moore's Garage. Moore's won by 39 to 18, which showed that Moore's had the better of the play. They had the best team all round. St. James' were too slow for the speedy boys from the garage. Dr. John Brown, of New York referred this game. The teams—St. James—Stoige and Gillespie, forwards; Singleton, centre; Atkinson and Hawley, defence. Moore's Garage—King and Gilbert, forwards; Orr, centre; McCormack and Moore, defence.

The second game, between the Wholesalers and Queen's was just as fast as the first one, and drew forth the well-merited applause from the spectators at different times when the playing was good. Back and forth from one end of the room to the other the teams fought and scrambled. Queen's having the better of the play at a great many stages of the game, their quick headwork and lightning combination work being one of the many excellent features of the game. When Queen's would get a lead of a few baskets, the Wholesalers would rally, and by a series of fast plays, would even it and at a few points were ahead of Queen's. The game, which was a very grueling one, was far more exciting than the first one, and finished at the 33 to 33. Frank Birch umpired in a satisfactory manner.

May Play in Two Sections.

Montreal Gazette. If all goes well in Intercollegiate hockey circles next Saturday probably see the final acceptance of McGill's suggestion to extend the league so as to include Laval, of Quebec, and Ottawa College and to play off the schedule in two sections. Toronto, Queen's and McGill playing in one division and (Laval) Montreal and the two new teams in the other. The suggestion came as the result of Toronto's resignation from the league and the subsequent statement that the Varsity team could not continue in the league until Laval was dropped, as the presence of a second Montreal team necessitated two trips to Montreal each year and created far too heavy an expenditure.

Ottawa College has accepted the invitation to join the league; Laval, of Quebec, although they have not definitely promised, seem inclined to follow the Ottawa lead; Queen's have made no objection to the proposed new arrangement, and Toronto has indicated its willingness to remain in the league under the proposed new conditions.

One of the Intercollegiate league will probably be held in Montreal Saturday to conclude arrangements and draw up the schedule.
