GENERAL ELLIOTT RETIRED.

Performed Duty in Many Parts of World.

Washington, Dec. 1.—Major-General George F. Elliott, commanding the United States marine corps, was placed on the retired list of the navy, yesterday, by operation of the age limit law. Col. William P. Biddle, the next ranking officer, probably will succeed him.

With the retirement of General Elliott another American hero has passed. General Elliott is a native of Alabama. He was appointed second lieutenant in the marine corps on October 12th, 1870. Since then he has performed duty in many parts of the world, serving on nine different naval vessels, and at many stations.

AUTOMOBILE SKIDDED. To Avoid Court—Hit a Pole—Parties Injured. Toronto, Dec. 1.—Mrs. Cawthra Mulock and an friend, Miss Boulton, were hurt in an accident, yesterday afternoon, when the automobile in which they were being driven by Chauffeur Reynolds, skidded at the corner of Jarvis and Gerrard streets, and ran into a telegraph pole.

The car, No. 2596, was badly damaged, and the two ladies and the chauffeur injured.

"As far as I have been able to ascertain," said Cawthra Mulock, speaking of the accident shortly afterwards, "what happened was this: My car was coming up Jarvis street at a slow rate, driven by Reynolds, who is a very good man, and with the two ladies in it. A cart coming down the street deliberately turned in front of it, and in order to avoid a collision, Reynolds turned sharply, and the car skidded into a telegraph pole."

It was found that Miss Adele Boulton sustained a dislocated shoulder, and had her face cut by flying glass. She is a daughter of Melfort Boulton, of 4 Willocks street.

Mrs. Mulock and the chauffeur were both badly cut about the face and head by flying glass, in several cases the cuts being as deep as the bone. When the car struck the telegraph pole the big glass shield was shattered.
