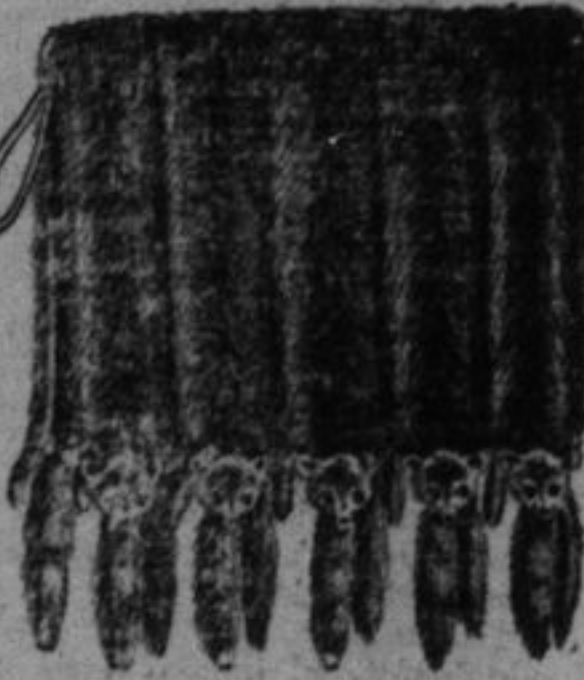

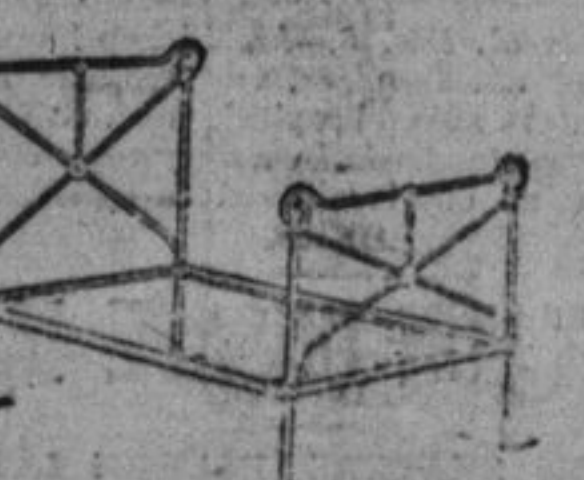

COATED OVER WITH ICE.

Steamer Glenmount Arrived From Fort William To-day.

When the steamer Glenmount arrived at the M.T. Co.'s elevator at noon to-day, with a cargo of grain, from Fort William, one would have thought that she came from the North Pole. The vessel was coated over with ice, and gave every evidence of having been up against some cold weather. The crew report a fine trip, however, as far as navigation goes, but there was some class all right to the kind of weather. But then this is all in a sailor's life, and they had to "grin and bear it."

The steamer Keystorm went out of the government dry dock this afternoon and the steamer India will go into the dock to-morrow.

This morning the steam drums were placed up for a double-header gale from the west.

The steamer Glenmount was expected to arrive at the M.T. Co.'s elevator on Monday, but was delayed. Word was received that she would arrive on Tuesday.

The members of the crew of the tug Bartlett were paid off yesterday, and left for their respective homes.

The crew of the steamer City of Montreal, discharging corn, at Richardson's elevator, were paid off, on Monday.

MORE ROOM WANTED IN REQUIRED AT THE GENERAL HOSPITAL.

An Earnest Effort Will Have to be Made Along That Direction—Warm Tribute to Service Rendered by Late Willie Glenn.

The regular monthly meeting of the board of governors of the Kingston General Hospital, was held on Monday afternoon, at four o'clock, in the board room, Present: James A. Minne (chairman), F. G. Lockett, B. W. Robertson, Rev. Dr. Mackie, Prof. Marshall, E. Welch, Rev. Dr. Laing, Col. Massie and F. Spangenberg. The report of the committee of management showed that a number of improvements had been energetically taken hold of during the past month, telephones installed, painting, redecorating, etc., all of which will tend to increase the efficiency and comfort of the hospital.

The visiting governors brought in a very satisfactory, and quite a lengthy report, alluding particularly to the marked improvement in all parts of the hospital, since their last visit, which occurred nearly a year ago. The question of the need of more accommodation, was again alluded to by these governors, who stated that the need was now becoming so great that an earnest effort would very soon have to be made.

A very touching and interesting reference was made to the late William Glenn, who, for over forty years, had given the best service which his connection with the hospital, that he seemed almost an integral part of the institution itself.

The report of the medical superintendent showed that the usual activity had been maintained throughout the month of October; 147 patients admitted and 135 discharged.

The relative of the late Willie Glenn wrote a letter to the governors, medical superintendent, medical staff, nurses and Miss Hunter, in which they expressed their deep appreciation of the kind, courteous and sympathetic treatment extended to the late Willie Glenn at all times during his sojourn at the Kingston general hospital, which in time he came to look upon as his home, and here he said, himself, his dearest and closest friends were to be found. More particularly are they grateful for the care and attention given him during his recovery, leaving nothing further that could be done.

A hearty vote of thanks was passed by the board of governors to the Women's Aid Society for so kindly undertaking and completing the painting of the outside of the buildings, including the nurses' home.

Visiting governors for the present month are Prof. Marshall and F. Spangenberg.

IN LABOR CIRCLES.

Three Unions Held Meeting on Monday Evening.

There were three regular meetings in Labor hall, on Monday night. There was a meeting of the Moulders' Union, the Seaman's Union, and the Painters' Union. Routine business was transacted.

The painters had with them, A. E. Scott, Winnipeg, general organizer for Canada and North Dakota. Mr. Scott succeeded the late Thomas Fisher, of Montreal, who passed away, very suddenly, about a year ago, in St. Louis. This was Mr. Scott's first visit to Kingston since his appointment, and his address dealt with the work of the union and matters of interest to the painters and their work.

Y.M.C.A. Boys' Conference.

F. Ritchie, boys' work director of Canada, is at the local Y.M.C.A., today, talking up the boys' conference to be held in Ottawa December 30th-January 1st. This will be one of the greatest conferences in the history of Y.M.C.A. work. It will be the uniting of church and association. The Boy Scout movement will have a separate conference. The boys' work in Sunday schools, led by Mr. Halpeny, will have its session, as will also the association, collegiate and university work. Mr. Ritchie will meet some of the Kingston boys at 4.30 o'clock this afternoon, and at 8.15 o'clock this evening, as well as adult Sunday school workers and board of directors. H. Hopkins, field secretary for the Canadian Y.M.C.A., is also in town.

Death of William Townsend.

William Townsend, an aged resident of this city, passed away, on Tuesday morning, at his home, on Tuesday street, after an illness extending some time. General debility was the cause. Deceased was born in England, about seventy-seven years ago, but for many years he had been a resident of the Limestone City. Beside his widow he leaves one son, W. H. Townsend, of this city. He was an Anglican, and the funeral service to-morrow afternoon will be conducted by Rev. R. S. Forner, pastor of St. Luke's church.

Rescued From Drowning.

George Taylor, prominent young Newboro hockey player was rescued from drowning on Sunday. He was skating near McCaskill's Island, and broke through the ice. He was in an exhausted condition when reached by a skiff, and brought to safety by Ernest Bell and William Lake. Percy Cavanagh, a boy, saw Taylor struggling and gave the alarm.

Wins Great Triumph in Montreal on Saturday.

"Tall, willowy, graceful, self-possessed, Miss Parlow glided on the platform at His Majesty's theatre, on Saturday afternoon. Indeed, it seemed no earthly music that flowed from her violin. Her tone is the finest singing tone we have had since Ysaye's greatest days. One of Sarasate's Spanish dances she played with fire, fervor and passionate coloring."

"The White Squaw." A play that is said to have valid claim upon the admiration and patronage of votaries of the stage is "The White Squaw," the romantic American drama to be seen at the Grand (return engagement), Saturday, December 10th, matinee and night. The play is by the actor-author, Della M. Clarke, and the scenes are laid in Michigan, about an hundred years ago. "The White Squaw" is a story of primitive folk of simple custom and straightforward living and, like strings that vibrate in musical harmony, the elements of love, romance, laughter and heart interest are employed in the making of a spoken and acted melody. There is not the slightest vestige of vice, villainy or sensation to the play.

St. George's Scouts.

The "Beaver" patrol of the St. George's Boy Scouts, left the city at 11 a.m., last Saturday and marching to Dead Man's Bay, lit some fires and cooked their dinners. At 2 p.m., the rest of the troop marched out under scoutmaster Hurd and scouted across Bayfield to the site of the old fort, and surrounded the "Beaver" patrol without being discovered themselves. They were successfully did. Then followed practice in making shelters out of scout's staves and small branches of trees. Part of the second class scout examination was tried and successfully passed by some of the boys. Instructions in bandaging and carrying wounded persons was also given by the scoutmaster. The troops returned to the city at about 6 p.m.

Churches Already Covered.

WHERE IS "HARRY" PELO?

Believed to be in Kingston—Grandmother Dead at Ogdensburg.

The police have been asked to find "Harry" Pelo, believed to be a resident of this city. His grandmother is dead, at Ogdensburg, N.Y., and he is wanted home, at once. The police received the telegram late on Monday afternoon, but so far they have been unable to find the man, and the police have come to the conclusion that he does not live in Kingston.

Dearer Coffee.

The housekeeper will have to make up her mind to pay more for the favorite breakfast beverage in the near future or buy a poorer quality, and few are prepared to do the latter. Reliable information from South American countries confirms previous reports that the growing coffee crop will be much beneath the average and totally inadequate to meet the demands of the constantly increasing consumption.

Importers are now paying 4 to 5 cents per pound more than six months ago and as the profit of the retail dealer is none too large on high grade coffees, he will either have to increase his selling price or accept a profit much smaller than he ought to get considering the expense of a well managed retail establishment. The consumer has the consolation that old prices will no doubt be restored in the course of a year or so, and it is more than probable the crop of 1911 will be a good one.

What Ald. Carson Says.

Ald. Carson, chairman of the water-works committee, desires to say that he has no excuse to offer for recommending the city council to buy welded steel pipes to replace the injured portion of the intake. He considers the difference between the cost of the welded pipe and the riveted as money spent in the interest of the health of the citizens. He declares that he would take no chances with riveted pipe, when something better can be had for a little more money.

To Enlarge Wolfe Islander.

The Wolfe Islander rounded up on Monday afternoon and decided to enlarge and improve the steamer Wolfe Islander at a cost of \$6,000. The boat will be lengthened fifteen feet and false sides will be added. The steamer will then be able to carry 375 passengers, as compared to 175 at present. The council decided that the money would be well expended in enlarging the steamer, which is not large enough to carry the island passengers and freight.

Kingston the Good.

Kingston is certainly on her good behaviour, these days, at least, so far this week, for there has been no session of the police court yet. Monday morning, there was a clean sheet, for Magistrate Farrell, and again this morning, there was no docket. The Portsmouth philosopher says that the people are so busy, getting ready for Christmas, that they have no time to get into trouble.
