The Parliament Bill. Toronto Globe. The parliament bill, which is the official name of the veto measure of the government, was introduced on April 14th, and contains the following provisions:

(1) If the peers withhold their assent to a money bill for more than one month after such a bill has been sent to them by the commons, such bill may be presented for the royal assent, and will then become law without the consent of the peers.

(2) Whether or not a bill is a money bill is decided by the speaker of the House of Commons.

(3) If a bill other than a money bill is passed by the commons in three successive sessions (whether of the same parliament or not), it shall, on a third rejection by the House of Lords, be presented to his majesty for the royal assent, and become law with such assent.

A SAD CATASTROPHE.

P. C. Dulmage Was Burned to Death.

Piston Gasser. The community received a great shock, early Thursday morning, by the news that P. C. Dulmage had been burned to death in his barn, together with the entire contents and stock.

He lived near Bentley's Corners, on the Cherry Valley Road, Deceased and his sister, who resided with him, retired about the usual hour on Wednesday night. About 2:30 o'clock, Thursday morning, his sister heard him get up and go out of the house, but thinking nothing was wrong, went to sleep again.

About an hour later she was awakened by the reflection of the fire on her bedroom window, and quickly rushed out of the house to find the barn all in flames. Her first thought was to find her brother, but could not do so anywhere.

The entire barn, containing the season's crop of hay and grain, one horse and seven cows, was completely burned. Deceased had gone out of the house in his shirt sleeves and only a pair of slippers on his feet.

It was at once expected that he had been burned in the barn. The neighbors began a search at once and about noon found the bones of his remains. The cause of so horrible a calamity will never be known.

Deceased was a bachelor, and a well-to-do farmer of the district. He had leased his farm and was getting ready to move to Picton to reside. Since leasing his farm he has been in a sort of demoralized mood, not wanting to leave the old homestead.

Deceased was aged sixty-three years. The funeral took place, on Saturday, at Cherry Valley, under the direction of the Masonic order, of which deceased was a member.

WANTS INFORMATION. In Regard to Gilbert and Osborne Families. The author of the "Purdy Family" article, accompanied by a portrait of the late John Wesley Purdy, which appeared in the Whig on May 31st, has received a communication from San Francisco, Cal., on behalf of a patron of the Geological Society of that state, requesting further information regarding the Gilbert and Osborne families mentioned in that article, as having married into the Purdy family.

Mary Gilbert, daughter of Misjah Gilbert, a Quaker, of New York state, married David Purdy, 1755 (settled at Black River, forty miles from Pittsburgh, Pa.), who was killed on board a British man-of-war, in 1778, during an engagement.

David Purdy, Jr., born October 26th, 1776, married Abigail Osborne and settled at Belleville, Ont., where some of her family also took United Empire Loyalist farms.
