Winnipeg, Man., Dec. 7 .- At four o'clock this morning fire broke out in the engine room of the Rat Bortage lumber company on the St. Boniface side of the river and so rapidly did bers of respectable families and are the flames spread that within ninety minutes the flames had engulfed th entire saw mill, including the engine house, the box factory and the drying cilm. Serious fears entertained for the extensive stables and large numbers of horses were let loose in the ad oining fields of St. Boniface hospital. President D. C. Cameron estimated the loss at between one hundred and fifty and two hundred thousand dollars, which is insured at about eighty per cent its value.
