CITY HOCKEY LEAGUE

THE ANNUAL MEETING HELD LAST EVENING.

H. Milne Elected President and J. J. McDermott Secretary—Schedule to be Drawn Up on the 15th—Other Hockey News.

Those who attended the City Hockey League annual meeting, held in the Y.M.C.A. building, last evening, were pleased with its growing prosperity, and are confident that it is about to open another successful season. Vice-President H. A. Gravelle, of Port Hope, called the meeting to order at eight o'clock. Dr. J. S. Hartly and W. W. Gibson gave valuable assistance in the formation of amendments to the constitution, that the league may be of the greatest benefit in the promotion of the hockey situation in Kingston.

A new feature this season will be a juvenile series, with age limit of sixteen years, to play for a handsome cup, presented by H. Angrove. The rules of the O.H.A. will apply to the junior and senior series. Any club in the city may join the league. All clubs that formed the league last year were represented, and will take part again this season.

A meeting will be held on December 15th, to admit any new club that may wish to join, and to arrange the schedule.

The election of officers resulted: Honorary president, Dr. J. J. Hartly and W. W. Gibson; honorary vice-presidents, Mayor Couper and H. Angrove; president, H. Milne, secretary-treasurer, J. J. McDermott. The executive will be composed of one member from each club.

The teams represented were: Y.I.C. B.A., Portsmouth, Granites, Barrieffield, Regiopolis and K.C.I. A great deal of difficulty was experienced in the league last winter on account of the fact that games which were not finished had to be played over again. It was decided that if games were not finished each team would be credited with one point and call it finished. It was also made plain that captain and manager of each team would form the part of the executive in voting on general matters.

Made a Good Choice.

The members of the City Hockey League certainly made a wise choice when they elected Harvey Milne to the position of president of the league for the past season. The following were elected: Honorary president, Dr. J. J. Hartly; honorary vice-presidents, J. McDonald Mowat and W. W. Gibson; president, Enoch Godwin; first vice-president, Arthur Casterton; secretary, Stanley Hall; treasurer, G. G. Cannon. The club expects to have a larger membership than in the past season, and a good winter's sport is looked forward to.
