LOCAL OPTION FIGHT FIGHT CONSUMPTION

IN GANANOQUE IS NOW BECOMING WARMER.

Gananoque, Dec. 10.—The anti-movement against local option is being pushed quite vigorously. Space in the Journal and Reporter has been engaged to voice opposition views on the subject and in addition to this committee is pushing a personal canvass of the electors.

The Parmenter & Bullock company are the first to inaugurate a system for local fire protection and have granted the use of used hose belonging to the town. Their system will protect themselves and adjoining factories. It is expected that other manufacturers will fall in line and furnish a reasonable amount of protection for their own establishments.

THERE ARE 300 CASES REPORTED IN KINGSTON.

Daughters of the Empire Have Organized a Nurse to Visit Cases—The Citizens Asked to Become Interested.

The Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire, realizing that if headway is to be made against the spread of tuberculosis in Kingston, there must be a more strenuous fight made against it, has engaged a trained nurse to do visiting in the homes of the afflicted, and has also opened a dispensary to supply the nurse with necessities for her work.

Reliable authorities say there are upwards of three hundred cases in Kingston, and that few, if any, precautions are taken against the spread of the disease. This organization, as well as supporting the nurse and dispensary by conducting an educational campaign.

In less than two weeks, six cases were reviewed, and the capable committee, working with Miss Wilson, reports that it must have the support and co-operation of every member of the Daughters of the Empire to win success in stamping out this plague.

There are two cases in the shack of the general hospital, both young women, one of whom has gained several and a half pounds in two weeks, under proper treatment.

This disease when taken in the incipient stage is almost always curable, while when it passes a certain stage it is almost certainly inoperable, and if citizens of Kingston would realize this, there would be a more general and sympathetic desire to help the unfortunates, and to assist the Daughters of the Empire in their work.

THE LATEST FIGURES. Gains and Losses on Both Sides are Equal.

London, Dec. 10.—Liberal gain of three seats from the unionists, on the returns announced, and one more equalized, the allied coalitionists and unionists each having captured twenty-one seats from the other. The total of seats thus far secured in the new parliament are: Coalitionists, 267; unionists, 234. The balance between the Liberal and Coalitionists, 175; unionists, 51; O'Brien, 17; labor members, 31.
