**AT THE POLICE COURT**

**MARRIED MAN'S STRONG PLEA FOR A CHANCE**

He left the court after saying, "God bless you, your worship."

There were two drunks in the rest of the line-up. One was fined \$2 and costs, or twenty days, and the other was given a chance, as it was the first time he had ever been before the police court.

They were a sorrowful looking pair, and both vowed that they would never fall into the hands of the police, again. This is what they all say, but then, it is to be hoped that they will be able to carry out their promise.


