

HIS GREAT GIFTS Five Dollars a Box

THE BENEFACTIONS OF AN- DREW CARNEGIE.

He Has Bestowed the World Over Some \$18,000,000—Seeing the Benefits of Benevolence While He Lives.

Andrew Carnegie's gift of \$10,000,000 for the furtherance of international peace brings the total of his benefactions to something like \$180,000,000. The endowment increased to-day is second in size to only three others of his—the \$10,000,000 foundation for the advancement of teaching, made in 1905 and increased to \$15,000,000 in 1908, the \$16,000,000 endowment of the Carnegie Institute in Pittsburgh and the \$12,000,000 fund for re-establishment of the Carnegie Institute in Washington. Mr. Carnegie's gift to libraries during the past twenty years are estimated at \$55,000,000 for the United States and \$17,000,000 abroad.

Following is a list of his largest known benefactions: Libraries, \$53,000,000. Educational foundation, \$15,000,000. Pittsburgh Institute, \$16,000,000. Washington Institution, \$12,000,000.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR UNION.

Next World's Convention in Sydney, Australia.

Boston, Dec. 16.—The next convention of the World's Christian Endeavor Union will be held in Sydney, Australia, in 1914, the annual business of the union held in this city having so decided.

President Francis E. Clark reported that more Christian Endeavor societies had been formed of late than ever in the history of the movement, and that the body is in an unusually healthy financial condition. There is now no country in the world without its Christian Endeavor societies, President Clark said.

An invitation to the World's Christian Endeavor Union to hold the world's convention following the Sydney meeting in Toki, Japan, in 1917, was referred to the executive committee.

The Mystery of a Duel.

HUNDRED YEARS OF PEACE.

Committee to Invite King George to Canada.

Toronto, Dec. 15.—Col. James Mason, chairman, and F. S. Neville, secretary, of the executive committee of the centennial celebration, have invited Mayor Geary to attend the meeting to be held in the city-hall on Friday afternoon to complete arrangements with their project.

They aim to invite King George to Canada in 1912, or one or two years later, for a national celebration of the successful defence of Canada in 1812-14. They would erect a monument to celebrate it and would hold a great pageant also. They suggest that if the United States wishes to do anything definite in the matter of a celebration of 100 years of peace at the same time, it should make perpetual the Rush-Bagot convention, which prohibits armaments on the great lakes. This convention is now terminable by either Canada or the United States on six months' notice.

A LOIR FOR VIVIAN GOULD.

George Gould's Second Daughter Betrothed to Baron.

London, Dec. 15.—The marriage engagement is announced of Lord Decies and Miss Vivian Gould, second daughter of George J. Gould, of New York.

John Graham Hope Horsley Beresford, fifth Baron Decies, succeeded to the title a short time ago, through the death of his brother. He was born December 5th, 1866. He is a lieutenant-colonel of the 7th Hussars and a member of the distinguished service order. He has fought in many campaigns, serving against the Mad Mullah in Somaliland, in the Matabele war and the Boer war. Miss Gould is in her nineteenth year.

SHIP TO AID GRENPELL.

Will Spend Christmas in England With Mother.

New York, Dec. 16.—Dr. Wilfrid T. Grenfell, missionary to the fishermen on the coast of Labrador, has arrived in this city from Palm Beach, Fla., where he went on the invitation of George B. Chett to consult about plans for building a schooner which Dr. Chett has offered to Dr. Grenfell. This will cost \$25,000 and will be used to convey supplies from New York and Boston.

Dr. Grenfell is accompanied by Mrs. Grenfell and Wilfrid T. Grenfell, jr., two and one-half months old. They are on their way to England to spend Christmas at Parkdale with the aged mother of the missionary.

\$2,000,000 FOR COAL GONDOLAS.

Terminal Receivers Authorized to Spend That Sum.

Pittsburg, Pa., Dec. 16.—H. W. McMaster and F. H. Skelding, receivers of the Wabash-Pittsburg Terminal railroad, were granted permission in the United States district court to spend \$2,000,000 for gondolas to be used in the lake coal-carrying traffic. It is stated that bids will be asked at once, and the orders placed as soon as possible. The money will buy 2,000 cars. Because of the inadequate equipment, the road has been unable to handle a large tonnage of coal, and great loss has followed.

A Referendum Exhibit.

Buffalo Times. A South Dakota referendum ballot in the possession of the News is seven feet long and nine inches wide, and covered with proposed laws in fine print. One of them runs to 76 sections and has about 20,000 words in it. Another sheet, about two feet long, is covered with proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State, and then there was the ballot proper with names of candidates will be voted. In Oregon the people voted on thirty-two amendments and some other things, and the ballot was eight feet long by a width that was a trifle too narrow to cover an ordinary bed. Houston, Tex., Dec. 16.—Mounted Officer Lubbock, of this city, shot and probably fatally wounded James Fife, also a mounted policeman. Fife was with Lubbock's daughter on the street when the latter met them and opened fire. Miss Lubbock ran to her father and endeavored to keep him from shooting. The attentions of Fife to Lubbock's daughter were objectionable to Lubbock.

Didn't Start Forest Fire.

Golden Gate, Wash., Dec. 16.—Louis R. Glavis, principal witness in the Pinchot-Ballinger hearing, was acquitted on the charge of having started a forest fire. The jury was out twenty minutes. The evidence showed that Glavis had nothing to do with a big forest fire near White Salmon, alleged to have been caused by a small fire started on his own land.

Two Girls Asphyxiated.

Youngstown, O., Dec. 15.—A special from Salem, Ohio, says: Esther Needham and Elva Sheen, cousins, each fifteen years old, were found asphyxiated in bed in the Salem house. The fire in a gas stove in the room is believed to have been accidentally extinguished, allowing the gas to escape.

Another Weekly for Montreal.

Toronto, Dec. 16.—Arthur Hawkes, superintendent of publicity for the Canadian Northern railway, has resigned and will go to Montreal to print and edit a weekly paper for circulation in Great Britain. The paper will be devoted to the task of better informing the British people about Canada.

Tried to Bribe the Mayor.

Tulsa, Okla., Dec. 16.—Mayor L. J. Martin, in a published statement, said that the leaders of the liquor and gambling elements offered him \$3,700 a month for protecting them. The mayor, in reply, said he would lead future raids against resorts in person.
