The proposition which he put forth regarding the juniors did not meet with the approval of the executive and it was decided to ask him to reconsider this part of the clause in the drawing up of the schedule the other evening the names of the Wolfe Island and Renfrew clubs were inadvertently omitted from the list. 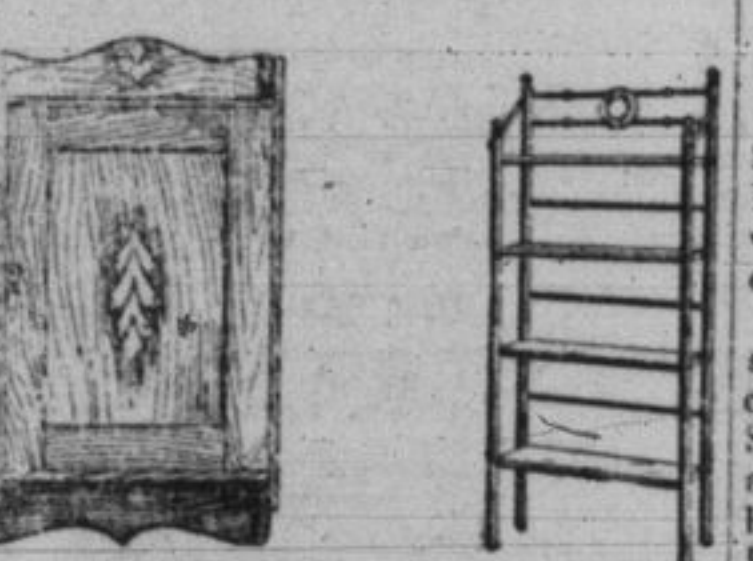

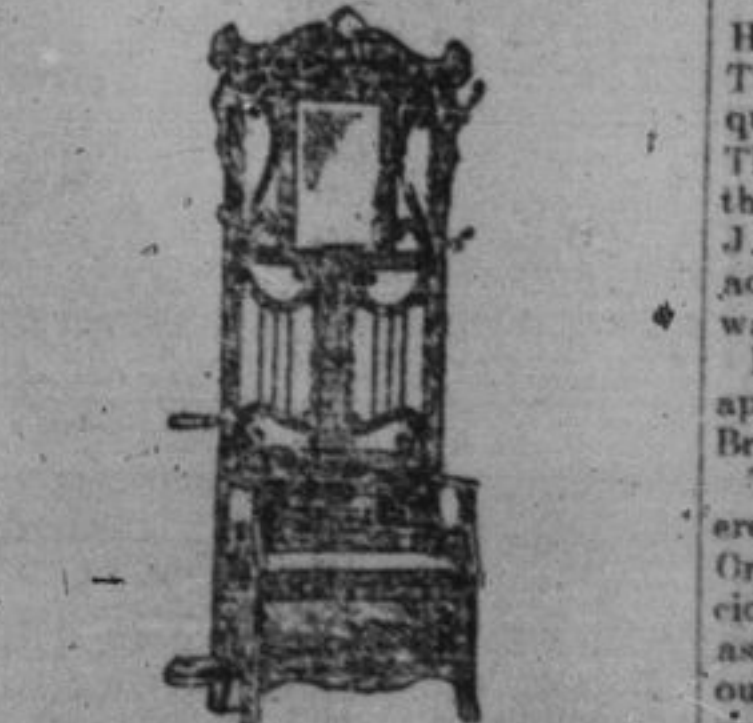

The Intercollegiate has here before started about the 20th of January and Frontenacs did all they could to avoid a clash.

Not Yet Organized. Although there has been quite a lot of talk about the formation of a Mercantile Hockey League there appear to have been no steps taken to get things in working order. Whether the men suddenly lost interest in it or thought it was too large a proposition to handle, it would be hard to say, but it seems as though it had fallen through.
