FRONTENAC JUNIORS TO PLAY QUEBEC CHAMPIONS.

More Curling Skips Elected—Finish of Y.M.C.A. Basketball League—Hockey Teams Busy Arranging For Practices.

The Junior Frontenacs were on the gymnasium floor at the Y.M.C.A., last evening, again getting in shape for their first game, on January 2nd. The boys are acquiring the wind and staying powers required to play the game properly. James T. Sutherland was present, keeping a watchful eye over the youngsters, to see that they were well attended to when practice was over.

The Game Postponed.

There was to have been a basketball game in the City League series, last evening, in the Y.M.C.A. gymnasium, between St. James' and Moore's Garage, but owing to the fact that a number of the members of Moore's team were attending the dinner of the Engineering Society, at Queen's, the game had to be postponed. It will likely be played off some night this week.

There Was No Meeting.

It was reported that there was to have been a meeting of the executive of the City Hockey League, last evening, for the purpose of arranging a date for a game with a Montreal team, but there was "nothing doing."

Arranging Hockey Practices.

The managers of the different hockey teams are very busy arranging for practices for their various teams. As there are a large number of teams in the city at the present time, it will keep the four rinks busy to arrange dates satisfactorily.

Finish of Y.M.C.A. Basketball.

The Y.M.C.A. Basketball League has finished for the season, the last league game being played Monday night. The boys have had a great deal of sport out of the league, as well as a great deal of development, which will enable them to go a step higher and probably play in the city league next year.

Frontenacs vs. Montreal Juniors.

The Junior Frontenacs should be in good shape for their first scheduled game with Belleville, on January 2nd, after the game with "Chaucer" Elliott's Junior Quebec champions, on December 25th. There must be some class to "Chaucer's" bunch to win the championship of the lower province, and a game between the champion teams from two provinces should be one that would be well worth seeing.

Re a Bouspiel.

The matter of having a bouspiel at the local rink was discussed at the meeting of the executive of the Kingston curling club on Tuesday night but was left over until a later date, to be decided upon. Owing to the fact that there are so many games to be played, and the fact that the membership has increased to such an extent, the executive considers that it would be advisable to allow the matter of a bouspiel to stand over for the time being.

Eagerly Await Results.

The result of the game between St. James' and Moore's will be eagerly awaited by those who are interested in basketball. If the St. James' bunch do the seemingly impossible thing, and defeat Moore's, it will tie things up pretty well. But if Moore's go through this game and the one which is to be played with the Wholesalers next Tuesday night, they will be champions of the league. Next Tuesday's game is the last scheduled one in the league. Of course, if things are tied up in the last game, the dates for the finals will have to be set. There is a possibility that the last game will not be played off next Tuesday night, on account of the fact that the pick of the players here are being sent to Ottawa on New Year's day to compete with a team there.

A motion was carried to the effect that the age limit of the senior juveniles should be raised to seventeen years, taking effect on the first of January. MINERS ENTOMBED

THREE HUNDRED HELD BELOW THE SURFACE

By a Terrible Explosion, Which Jammed the Shafts and Stopped Ventilation—Only One Boy so Far Has Come Up.

Bolton, England, Dec. 21.—Nearly three hundred miners are entombed, today, in the Hulton company's colliery, as a result of an explosion which jammed the shafts and stopped ventilation.

Of all the men in the mine when the explosion occurred, only one lone boy has so far "made his way to the surface. The number of dead will not be definitely known for some time. The vicinity of the shaft mouth is crowded with women and children crying for their relatives.

When the shaft was finally opened the flames spat out toward the sky. It is impossible for many to be alive in the mine.

Hundreds of people were gathered about the mouth of the mine and the grief of families of the entombed men led to many dramatic incidents. Wives and mothers of the victims tried to enter and were only restrained by an extra detail of police.

Many of the corpses recovered were unrecognizable from burns and dismemberment. The force of the explosion was sufficient to dent most of the victims of all their clothing. Among the victims were a number of small boys, who were serving as helpers.

Bolton, where the mine is located, is a manufacturing centre, with 200,000 people.

Death of Nelson Gibson.

Nelson Gibson, a young man aged twenty-one years of age, who has been ailing for some time past, died in the general hospital, on Tuesday, of typhoid fever. He was a young man of very quiet disposition and had been employed in the locomotive works up till he was taken ill. The funeral will take place from the residence of his sister, Mrs. William Amey, Colborne street, Thursday afternoon. Services will be conducted by Henry Buck, pastor of the Free Methodist church.
