"He was taken into Gladstone's government to please the radical wing of the party, and intrigued against his chief, working up outside the cabinet a party for himself and drawing from Gladstone, as Laborer told us in Truth, about the bitterest words that ever fell from Mr. Gladstone's lips." The singular thing is that at that time Gladstone was the unionist and Chamberlain the home ruler. When Gladstone became a convert to home rule, Chamberlain turned against it "and without apology or explanation went over to the conservative camp." His next move was a repetition against Balfour of the manoeuvre against Gladstone. "After getting rid by a trick of the free trade members of the cabinet, Chamberlain went out of it, leaving his son to work as a condescender in it, got up a protectionist movement of his own, captured the party organization and press, meaning when this was done to press Balfour on the rocks." "To Chamberlain was due the Boer war, the consequences of which, after seeing them on the spot, led him to cover them by an agitation for tariff reform, as he and his followers called protection."

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BUBONIC PLAGUE RAGING.

Corpses Mark the Sites of Abandoned Camps.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 22.—The correspondent of the Bosh at Vladivostok telegraphs that the ravages of the bubonic plague in Mongolia are unchecked. Corpses frequently mark the sites of abandoned camps of nomads. The situation in Manchuria is grave. The German consul at Harbin has addressed a pressing note to the Chinese Taotai demanding that radical measures be taken to stay the epidemic and stating that otherwise German will interfere. The municipality of Harbin has invited Japanese physicians to attend the diseased in the barracks, as the Russians refuse to expose themselves.

The mortality has been appalling. From October 26th to December 11th, 42 Chinese and 11 Russians have been stricken and 41 Chinese and 10 Russians have died within the precincts of the Eastern Chinese railroad.

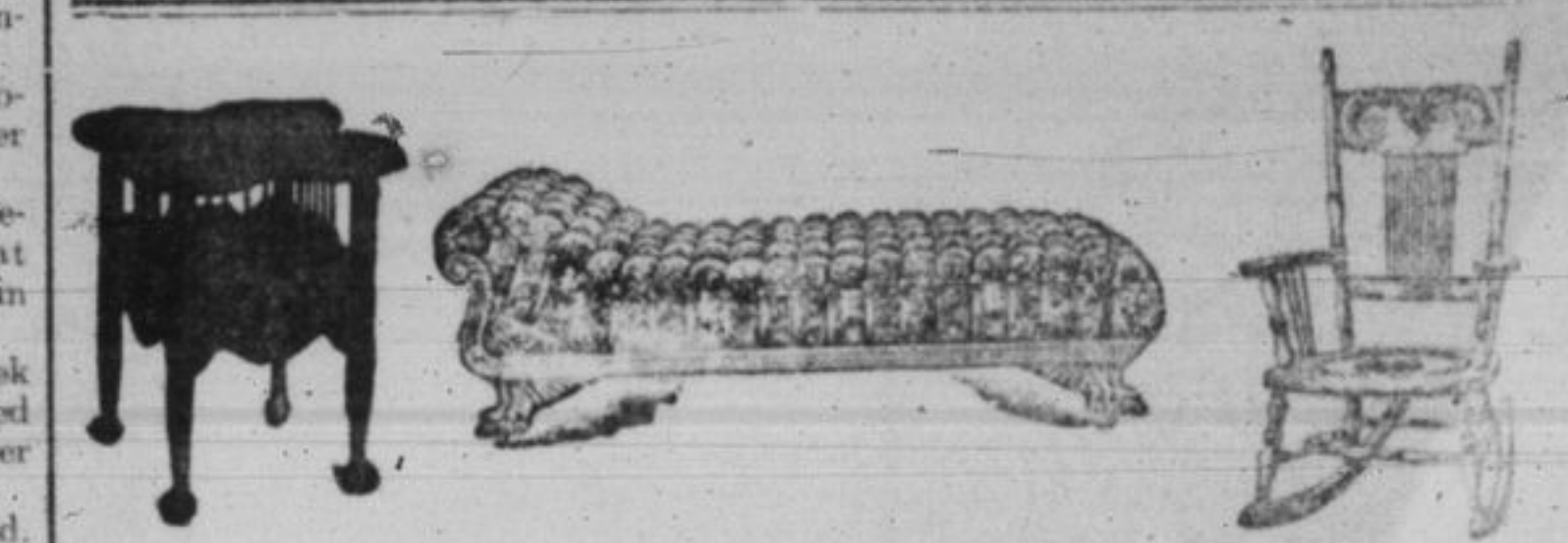

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a certain section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must be in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district in which the land may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least six acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section along the road. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead rights and cannot obtain pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.00. W. W.
