Ottawa, Dec. 24 .- The bounties pais upon the manufacture of iron and steel will expire on December 31st. It was not considered wise to make these staples dearer by imposing . duty at the customs, as in the case of other articles, but in order to support infant industries against foreign-competition, a bounty has been paid since 1896, which amounts in the aggregate

to \$15,479.25. Last year the bounty paid came to \$1,808,533. This went in great part to the Dominion Steel Corporation, \$1, 029,503; to the Algoma company Sault Ste. Marie, \$348,814, and to the Hamilton Steel and Iron company Hamilton, \$235,408.
