## Tips For Farmers

he moved that his hearers petition the government to pass a law prohibiting the sale of eggs unfit for food. John Clark, Cainsville, Ont., seconded the motion, but it was not put to the meeting. Peter White, Pembroke, Ont., said, "If the poultry business can't be improved except by making the farmers criminals, the poultry business had better stay where it is."

### Buys Canadian Apples.

Andrew Carnegie has ordered from an Ottawa agency twenty barrels of Canadian apples to be sent to friends in Scotland as Christmas presents. Mr. Carnegie has done the same thing for the past three years, ever since, while in Ottawa, he tasted an apple which he found more delicious than anything he had ever eaten.

At an auction sale of Holstein grade cows, held by William Pierce, near Tilsonburg, eleven cows sold for an average of \$165. One cow sold for \$225.

The milk of these cows was sold to the condenser at Tilsonburg during the past summer. They averaged 9,184 pounds of milk for the seven months, and the money returns well \$105.36 per cow. Three were three-year-olds, and six were over six years.

### Produce and Prices.

Kingston, Dec. 24.—The market clerk reports the prices prevailing as follows: Carrots, 6c. per bag; turnips, 4c. to 5c. per bag; cabbage, 5c. each; onions, \$1.50 per bag; potatoes, 75c. to 85c. per bag; celery, 5c. to 7c. per bag.

John McKay, Brock street, reported at the Guelph Winter Fair Prof. Day said:

Corn ensilage is particularly valuable as a feed for dairy cattle, because of its succulence. It is true that one of the largest condensers in the United States absolutely refuses to allow the feeding of ensilage, but most other condensers encourage the use of it. It seems to depend entirely on the quality of the ensilage itself.

Some have used ensilage in the feeding of sheep. In our own experiments I have not been satisfied with the results in the lamb crop when ensilage was fed to sheep. Personally I prefer roots for this purpose but some good men have fed ensilage. For hoggs only a limited quantity of ensilage should be fed, and with hogs it may be used satisfactorily only for the purpose of giving a variety to the feed where there are no roots available.

Corn ensilage will give twenty-six and a half per cent dry matter against eleven and a half per cent, for swede turnips and the less quantity for mangold. These figures are based on American investigations, and it is probable that our turnips would show less dry matter because they are more succulent as a rule than those produced in the United States.

Dealing with some of the by-products of corn for feeding purposes, Prof. Day said that glucose meal contains about thirty per cent protein, but is a heavy, concentrated feed and must be used with caution.

Glucose feed contains usually about twenty per cent of protein. Honey-milk, a by-product of a breakfast food, is lower in protein than whole corn and is lower even in carbohydrates. It is not, therefore, worth as much for feed as whole corn.

### Casein or Cheese?

Partly as a result of the reduction in the duty on cream entering the United States from Canada, and partly owing to other causes, a new departure is developing in connection with the dairy industry of Ontario.

No less than seventeen factories in the Brockville district have been separating milk supplied them during the past summer and shipping the cream and casein contents to the United States. The cream—in some cases goes for American city consumption and in other cases to be made into butter in American factories. The casein is used in connection with the manufacture of paper and for other purposes. The factories which have done this have obtained for their patrons about \$1 per cwt. for the milk supplied by the latter, or some 15c. more than would have been obtained from the manufacturer of cheese.

In Western Ontario eight or ten factories are engaged in the extraction of casein for export to the United States, but, in these cases the fat from the milk is as a rule made into butter for the supply of the local market.

**Live Stock Condition in Canada.**  
A report issued by the census office at Ottawa says the number of horses in Canada shows an increase of 3.31 per cent, over last year. In milch cows there has been an increase of 1.13 per cent., in swine 2.11 per cent., and in poultry 8.02 per cent. The decline in horses and milch cows in Ontario is exceedingly small, but in horned cattle there has been a decline of 12.39, and in sheep 5.02 per cent.

In Ontario a decrease is reported in the number of all farm animals during the year, with the exception of swine, where there is an increase of 6.20 per cent., and in poultry 2.26 per cent. The decline in horses and milch cows in Ontario is exceedingly small, but in horned cattle there has been a decline of 12.39, and in sheep 5.02 per cent.

### Marketing Eggs.

John A. Gunn, vice-president of Gunn, Langlois company, limited, Montreal, dealt with the dealers' difficulties in marketing eggs. He said that it was estimated that in Canada this year the total production of poultry will be 25,000,000 head, and that the value of the poultry and eggs in Canada this year is \$18,000,000. He declared, the dealers' greatest difficulties were: First, the shortage of eggs and a lack of uniform supply; second, the cost of collecting eggs; third, the absence of standards and of necessary legislation. The shortage was proven by the fact that last year there was imported into Canada from Russia, China and the United States, over half a million dozen eggs. Mr. Gunn asked if it would not be possible, by hatching out a few early pullets, to continue the egg supply during the late fall and winter. He declared that in spite of the large number of eggs put away in the spring in cold storage, his firm stands prepared to pay forty-five cents a dozen, delivered at Montreal, for every guaranteed new laid egg that can be delivered now. He placed the average preventable loss at seventeen per cent, made up as follows: Spoiled and dirty eggs, 10c.; mouldy and bad flavor, 10c.; broken, two; chick down, one; five bad eggs, five; rotten, two; and condemned. And he placed at \$1,500.00 the sum which could be saved to Canada's farmers each year on eggs. He told of the laws in the United States to cover the sale of rotten eggs, and

## BARRIE STREET EXTENSION

Voting on By-Law Monday, January 2nd, 1911



### PROPOSED BY-LAW

A By-Law to raise by way of loan on the credit of the Debentures of the Municipality of the City of Kingston, the sum of \$3,000 for the purpose therein mentioned.

WHEREAS it is expedient to extend Harris Street from its terminus northerly from Quebec Street to Pine Street;

AND WHEREAS for the proposed extension of Harris Street, it is expedient to appropriate the following land to wit: All and singular that certain parcel or tract of land and premises hereinafter mentioned from any person, body corporate, who may be willing to advance the same upon the credit of the said debentures, the sum of \$3,000, or such sum or sums as the said person, body corporate, may desire to advance, and into the hands of the said Corporation for the purpose of the proposed extension of the Northern limit of Quebec Street with the northerly production of the western limit between Raglan Road and Quebec Street, thence northerly following the aforesaid northern production one hundred and six feet, or such further distance as may be required, to the rear boundary between lots number one (1) on Queen Street and number one (1) on Pine Street, and number one (1) on Queen Street, extending northerly following the aforesaid rear boundary nine feet and two inches (9' 2"), thence northerly and parallel to the above mentioned northward production one hundred and six feet, or such further distance as may be required, to the rear boundary between lots number one (1) on Queen Street and number one (1) on Pine Street, thence easterly following the aforesaid rear boundary one foot and ten inches (1' 10"), more or less, to a point on the northern limit of that part of Barrie Street between Raglan Street and Quebec Street, thence northerly following the last above mentioned northward production one hundred and six feet, or such further distance as may be required, to the rear boundary between lots facing on Pine Street and Quebec Street, respectively, on the northward production of the western limit fifteen feet (5'), thence southerly and parallel to the above mentioned northward production one hundred and six feet, or such further distance as may be required, to the rear boundary between lots number one (1) on Queen Street and number one (1) on Pine Street, thence 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
