SUNDAY'S EVENTS

A FINE SERVICE IN QUEEN STREET CHURCH.

Bethel Congregational Church was finely decorated—The Bible School of Sydenham Street Church was very busy.

Queen Street Methodist Sunday school had a fine open session on Sunday afternoon, with large attendance and fine programme. The church was finely decorated with evergreen and Christmas bells. The singing of the school was excellent, the music being very melodious. A fine orchestra of eight pieces assisted Miss Meek at the organ. Recitations were given by Earl Eigon, Russell Gardner, Clifford Reese, Jennie Ball, Artoia Haffner, Dorothy Allen, Doris Williams and Margaret Kelso. Solos were rendered by Miss Ila Weese and Miss Chapman; a duet by Misses Gladys and Ruby Quail. The junior, primary and kindergarten children also gave several selections and the choir gave two sweet anthems. R. Meek and E. W. Skinner were in charge and made addresses. F. Lake gave a pointed chalk talk. Miss Toye, school organist, was the mainspring of the successful affair.

The Bible School.

On Sunday last Sydenham street Bible school had a full day. Dr. Boyce, of the general hospital, gave a talk on the needs of that institution and a generous response was made by the school. D. A. Cays generously gave the school a life-size portrait of Dr. S. D. Chown, one of the general superintendents of the Methodist church of Canada, but who some years ago was a boy of this school. This picture was unveiled and, on behalf of Mr. Cays, was presented by S. Chown, another old member of this same school and accepted by A. Shaw. Both speakers dwelt on the characteristic and outstanding features of Dr. S. D. Chown's life and made a strong appeal to the scholars to follow in his steps. Another pleasing event was the presentation of a large stereoscopic lantern, for illustrating the lesson work. This was the gift of Mrs. George Richardson, a strong friend of the school. The school is now in a better position than ever to do its best work. The superintendent, T. F. Harrison, is in his twelfth year of superintendency.

At Bethel Church.

The Christmas services in Bethel Congregational church were of a very unique and most appropriate character. With the help of the Christian Endeavor Society the interior of the church had been tastefully decorated with evergreens wrought in various forms, but all suggestive of Christmas cheer. From the centre of the arch directly over the platform a large electric star was suspended, and during the night service, when all other lights in the building were turned off, the effect produced was pleasing indeed. The musical part of the services was well sustained by the members of the choir and the organist, Miss Isabel Morley. The male quartette rendered several suitable selections and vocal solos were contributed by Miss Gertrude Holland and Allen Haffner. Rev. A. P. Mershon presided at both services and delivered two addresses that were in keeping with the true spirit of the world's greatest festival.

At Zion Church.

In Zion church good sized congregations enjoyed hearty Christmas services on Sunday. The pastor, Rev. J. D. Boyd, preached in the morning, taking as his theme, "Christmas: Its Message and Inspiration." He said that behind the varied and increased activities and sacrifices and good-will of this season of the year was the unspoken gift of the Christ child. The clear knowledge of the Father's love, to all conditions of men, marked nations and institutions contribute to the Christmas festival, and showed good-will to all. The Christmas season is meant to inspire us for the year with the spirit of Him whose birth we are celebrating. The choir sang two very effective anthems.

The evening service was conducted by Prof. J. Morrison, who read the story of St. Luke and preached a pointed and practical sermon from the words: "Unto you is born a Saviour, and ye shall find Him wrapped in swaddling clothes lying in a manger." He noted how christianity had taken the most effective emblem of health and religion and made them her own, such as the mistletoe of the Druids, the gratuitous feast of the ancient Romans, etc. He remarked also the freedom and love that has come to women and children through the lowly birth of Christ, also the uplifting of all humble work. Arthur Trussell sang, in good voice, a Christmas solo.

ST. MARY'S MIDNIGHT MASS.

The Last Time Archbishop Gauthier Will Officiate.

At St. Mary's cathedral, the celebration of Christmas had, this year, a special interest, it being likely the very last time that Archbishop Gauthier would officiate as chief pastor of the diocese, and from this fact there arose an impressive and solemnity in the carrying out of the liturgical ceremonies of the midnight mass which lent to the occasion. Brilliantly illuminated, the vast edifice in his yet fresh decorations, with its superb altar daintily adorned with cut flowers and colored lights, the imposing ceremonies of the church, the incense and music and large, devout congregation; presented a scene enchanting.

As has stated in the above, Archbishop Gauthier officiated, having Rev. Fr. Mea as high priest and Rev. Fr. Hanley and Nelson as deacons. Rev. Fr. Halligan acted as master of ceremonies. At the close of the mass, his grace imparted the apostolic benediction. The musical part of the service, which had been carefully prepared, was executed with splendid effect. Millard's mass was rendered by also "Adagio Fidoles," "O Holy Night" and other selections. In the evening's magnificent "Fantum" was contributed, presided by the psalms in which the altar boys, under Rev. Fr. Halligan, participated. To the choir as a whole much credit is due, more particularly to N. E. O'Connor, the indefatigable leader, whose efforts secured the highest commendation. Prof. Paul Terry, as usual, ably presided at the organ.
