AN AGED CITIZEN PASSED TO REST ON SUNDAY.

Was Born at Burlington, Vermont, in 1825-For Years Was a Member of the Firm of Calvin Breck, Garden Island-Lived in Kingston Since 1880.

On Christmas Day, one of King ston's oldest and most loved citizens passed to his rest, in the person Ira A. Breck, in the eighty-sixth year of his age, Mr. Breck had been failing health for some time. end was peaceful, and came at on Sunday, at the residence of son. I. H. Breck, Barrie street. news of the passing away of Breck was heard with great sorrow throughout the city.

The late Mr. Breck was born at Burlington, Vermont, on Sept. 1st 1825, and was the son of Henry Breck, druggist. His mother was a sister of the late Judge Collamer, postmastergeneral of the United States and also senator for Vermont. He came with his parents to Cape Vincent, N.Y., in 1834. Afterwards he was clerk in O. P. Stanley's general store at the Cape for four years. Then he came t Garden Island, in February, 1845, am entered the employment of Calvin Cook as clerk of that old and well known business firm. On the retirement of Mr. Cook, in 1849, Mr. Breck became a partner, with D. D. 
