Its argument is that the cost of agricultural implements bears much more heavily upon the farmers who live at a distance from the manufacturing centres than upon those who are near at hand, and that, therefore, the proposed bonus would do more to place the farmers on an equality than the reduction or abolition of the customs tariff.

Some Promised Reforms. Manitoba Free Press. Mr. Lloyd-George announces that among the first government measures to be introduced in the new British parliament, will be a bill to abolish plural voting, and establish the principle of one man, one vote. It is estimated that this will cut off half a million unionist votes. Plural voting, like some other ancient anomalies, has been maintained by the House of Lords, against the will of the House of Commons. The abolition of the greatest anomaly of all the veto, will dispose of some of the others.
