DOBSON CAN'T PLAY

QUEEN'S LOSES ITS GREATEST FORWARD HOCKEYIST.

Dobson Has to Return Home on Account of Business Matters—The Presbyterians Cannot Possibly Replace Him.

Queen's intercollegiate hockey aspirations could not have experienced a more serious loss than was sustained this morning, when William Dobson, the mainstay of the Presbyterian forward line made the announcement that home-and-business interests will not permit him to complete his studies at Queen's this season.

Dobson holds a record which perhaps no other player in Canada can claim. During his career in Intercollegiate hockey he has never once been penalized for an offence of any description.

Earlier in the season it looked as though Queen's would easily retain the university championship, but with four places to fill they are at present in a doubtful if they will again wear a tri-color uniform.

Elections at Deseronto.

Deseronto, Jan. 2.—The by-law for Seymour electric power was voted upon, and carried by a majority of 319. The vote was 328 for; 13 against.

Vote at Smith's Falls.

Smith's Falls, Jan. 2.—The biggest vote in the history of municipal elections in Smith's Falls was polled here yesterday. Local option was responsible for the exceptional interest, and the by-law was defeated by 53 votes. It got a majority of 158, but failed on the necessary 60 per cent. by 53 votes. Local option was also defeated in Merrickville, Perth, Kitley and South Elmsley, and was carried in Wolford and Bastard.

CHOKED TO DEATH.

Smoke Did Serious Damage in Lonely Home.

Charlottetown, P.E.I., Jan. 3.—Colin Macphail, aged eighty-two, was choked to death by smoke, and his sister, aged eighty-nine, was burned to death in their lonely home, ten miles from here, where they kept the village post office and lived together.

Traverser in Jail.

Toronto, Jan. 3.—No bondsman was on hand when the case of W. R. Traverser, general manager of the Farmers' Bank, was called. He is now charged with the theft of \$40,000 as well as the falsification of returns. No plea or election was made and Traverser was taken back to jail. He is not allowed the use of a knife or fork in prison.

British Steamer Lost.

London, Jan. 3.—The wreckage reported picked up in the Bay of Biscay leaves no doubt of the fate of the British steamer Avon, which left London, December 9th, for West Africa ports, with a crew of thirty British and German sailors and four passengers. Evidently the vessel was lost in the heavy storms of mid-December.

Almost Asphyxiated.
