JUVENILE SCHEDULE

A DOUBLE HEADER TO BE PLAYED EACH SATURDAY.

The Age Limits Increased to Fifteen and Seventeen Years—Executive Met on Tuesday Evening.

A meeting of the juvenile hockey league executive was held Tuesday evening. It was decided to raise the age limit for junior and senior juveniles to fifteen years for the former on July 1st and seventeen years for the latter. It was also decided, on account of Yale dropping out, to change the schedule to one group, playing a double-header each Saturday morning. The first game will be called at ten o'clock, the second at eleven. Any games not played or scheduled for want of ice or bad weather will be played the following Wednesday evening. The referee alone shall decide if it is to play, and both teams must be on hand at the advertised time. The teams will play in the order in which they appear on the schedule. The first two play at ten o'clock; the next at eleven. Saturday, Jan. 7th, Y.M.C.A. will play Tecumseh at 10 o'clock, the Thistles and Regiopols at eleven o'clock, on the Palace rink. John Gratton will referee.

There will also be a double-header in the junior juvenile series at the Stadium rink between Midgets and Tusslers at ten o'clock and Y.M.C.A. vs. Scouts at eleven o'clock. B. L. Rielly will referee.

SEYMOUR POWER CO.

HASTINGS COUNTY INDUSTRIES BENEFIT.

Great Impetus Given by Cheap Power—Big Saving in Operating Expenses—Company's Representatives to Visit Kingston.

Belleville, Dec. 25.—The one thing necessary to insure the success of the mining industry in the Hastings mining region having been secured—namely, the introduction of cheap hydro-electric power—the industry is now in a better position than it has been for a few months furnished to the southern part of the territory, the tale mill at Madoc, the reduction works at Deloro and the Nichols company's chemical works at Subhigh all being operated by it, while preparations for its introduction into the Canada Cement company's two great mills at Point Am have been all but completed. Just to show how important is this new motive power to the mining industry, the fact is here stated on absolutely reliable authority that at one plant, which uses 500 horse-power, the cost, which was formerly \$90 per horse-power, with coal as fuel, is now \$20, and a saving of \$35,000 per year on that account. In small concerns this cheap power means all the difference between success and failure.

Gold Mining Developments.

The most important transaction in connection with gold mining in this region which has occurred, for a length of time was recently consummated by the sale of the Cordova mine in Belmont township, Peterboro county, to a syndicate, composed of Messrs. P. Kirkgaard, of Beloro, and William Hughes and Dr. Mackenzie. This property has on it a number of shafts, all in free milling quartz, and was profitable for several years, but for a length of time it had lain idle owing to differences among the management. Mr. Kirkgaard and his associates propose to work it on an extensive scale, and with the cheap power which is now attainable at their command, there can be no reasonable doubt of their success.

The Gilmour gold mine, which is situated six miles from Gilmour Station on the Central Ontario railway, has been operated successfully during the year that five more stamps are being added to their mill.

Other Mines Busy.

The corundum mine and mill at Craigmont are being operated with a full force.

The United States Graphite company, who have a mine and a mill at Wilberforce, are preparing to open a mine in Mayo township, as to which pretty favorable reports have been given out.

The Bridge Marble company continue work in their plant near Bancroft. The marble is sawn at the quarry and shipped to Toronto, where it is polished. The marble from this quarry has been used in the Armouries here, and in the new west wing of the Parliament Buildings at Toronto. Some of the best known mines, including the great deposit at Blairton, are under option to United States capitalists, who are paying royalty as well on a certain specified number of tons per day.

There is a strong demand for sale. The mill at Madoc is running night and day, and W. A. Hunsford, of Madoc, is reported to have refused \$50,000 for the large deposit of that mineral which he recently discovered near Eldorado.

Treating Cobalt Ores.

The reduction works at Deloro, which are running on Cobalt ores, are turning out three tons of silver weekly and a quantity of arsenic and lead. The silver is shipped directly to London, England.

Business is very brisk at the Sulphide Chemical Works, and an enlargement of the plant in the near future is probable.

NOTE.—The above extract is copied from the Globe of December 26th. On enquiry from Lord Colonel Cunningham, the representative of the Seymour Power and Electric Co., Limited, in Kingston, we learned that it is this company that is supplying power to the mines in Hastings. Representatives of the Seymour company are expected in Kingston in the course of a few days to confer with the civic authorities.
