

Toronte News. During 1910 Great Britain lent Canada another \$200,000,000, and she will continue to be a generous banker. Sir Edgar Speyer tells The Globe: It is of vital importance to Canada that the condition of credit generally has been rarely higher than it is today, and that Great Britain may be expected to lend freely in 1911. Great Britain will continue to supply capital to Canada with a generous hand for the development of the great natural resources with which she is endowed so abundantly. This willingress of Great Britain to lend Canadians-and this cannot be em phasized sufficiently often and sufficiently strongly-to permit nothing which in any way could impair . the confidence and readiness of the British investor to send his money to Canada, and Canada should appreciate the paramount necessity of offering only such securities in the home market as are absolutely good, for the margin which separates caution from fear is a very narrow one." The Canadian who tries to foist sound securities on the English vestor is a traitor as well as a cheat.
