Personal Revival Work Would Do It Says Rev. S. Sellery—The Week of Prayer Meeting East-Evening.

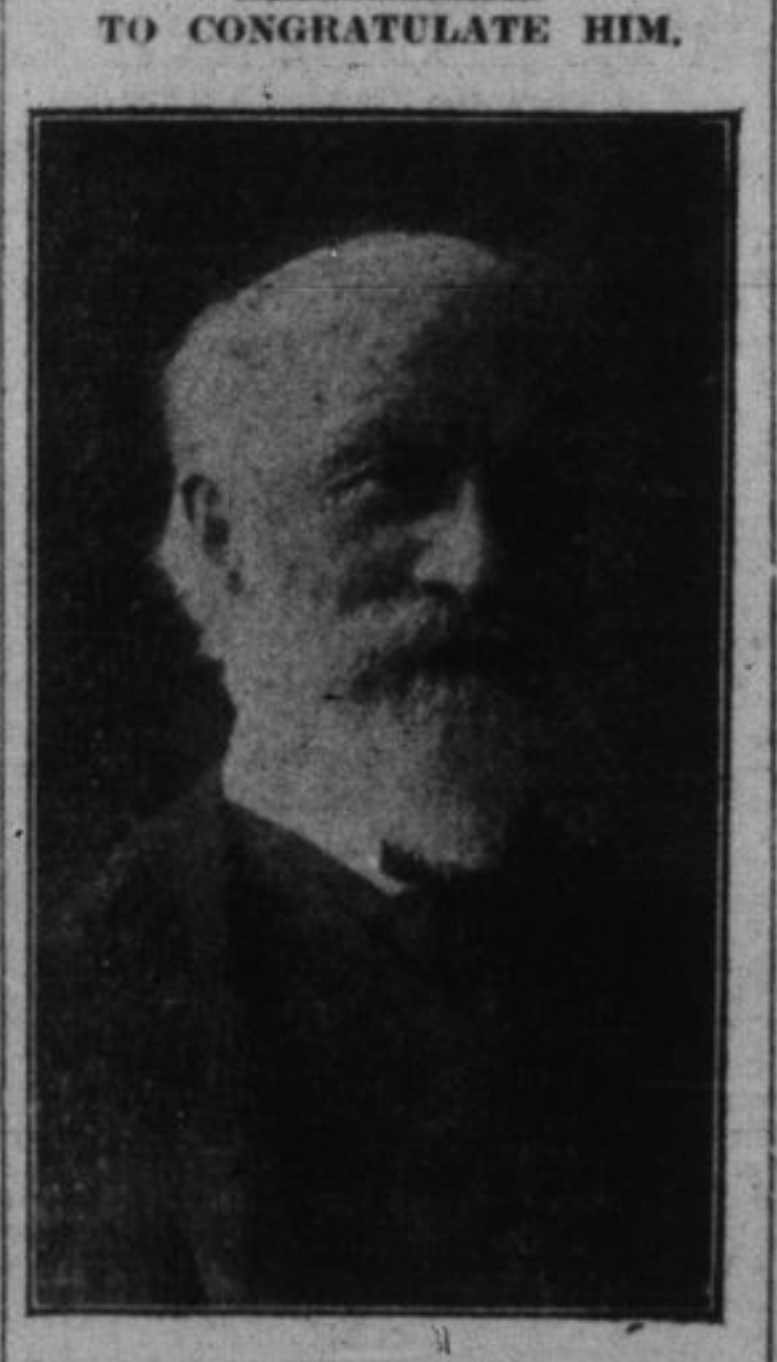
