Developers. Doctor Urges Business to Acquire Manual Skill.

London, Jan. 6.—Business men and women should use their hands in every possible way if they want to increase the quickness and adaptability of their brains, according to the latest idea of a well-known London doctor. He says: "The knots, sew, do fretwork, learn to make some of your own clothes, prepare and cook all your food, repair your boots and shoes, dig and plant your garden—in fact, anything and everything that calls for manual skill, if you want to have an active, resourceful and versatile brain."

"The business man whose work depends on a keen, quickly-working brain must have these assets in full. He must, speaking literally, turn his hand to everything, and be capable of constructing almost anything with his fingers."

"The truth of this statement lies in the fact that in every manual act the hand is directed by the brain."

"Again, every act of the hand upon the brain, strengthening and stimulating it, which is the only sure method of keeping that organ in keen, efficient working-order."

"That our fingers are gradually becoming less skilled is due to the numerous mechanical appliances which now carry out the various processes formerly done by hand."

"This state of affairs, since it stands the powers of the fingers, also stands the brain. The worker does his work mechanically, unthinking, and gradually, his brain grows torpid and impaired."

TRUTH WON HIM A JOB. Applicant for Postmastership Won Roosevelt's Goodwill.

Guthrie, Okla., Jan. 6.—When Theodore Roosevelt was president he was asked to appoint a certain man postmaster in an Oklahoma town. WYNOPS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agent for the district. Entry by 31.3.11 may be made at any agency, on certain conditions. By Father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Notice—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may have within one year of his homestead a farm of at least 40 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his mother, brother, sister, or other next of kin. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$20.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empted land six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to give 200 bushels of wheat and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in any district. Price, \$20.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years; cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.00.
