

The Napanee curling club succeeded in winning the championship and the handsome cup, offered last winter, by the Central Ontario curling league. At the local curling rink, yesterday afternoon, Napanee played off the tie with Brockville, and won out. Both clubs sent up two teams and Napanee won out in both the matches.

Last winter the season was very short and on this account it was found impossible to play off the tie and so arrangements were made to have the game played in Kingston, early in this season.

The ice was in good condition for the games and quite a few spectators turned out to watch the sport. The rink was thronged with people all afternoon. Everything is now in full swing at the curling rink.

In the Napanee-Brockville game Skip Dr. Leonard, of Napanee, defeated Skip D. W. Downey, Brockville, by 19 to 16, and Skip J. S. Ham defeated Skip Chrysler, by 21 to 16.

STOLEN WATCH RECOVERED.

Sixteen-year-old Lad Accused of Theft.

The arrest of one lad, yesterday afternoon, led to the arrest of another. When the lad placed under arrest for theft was being searched, at the police station, he was found to have in his possession a fine gold watch. When asked where he had secured it, he gave the name of his companion. He said that he was keeping the watch for his friend. The name "Ferguson" was on the watch, so the police were of the opinion that the watch had been stolen, and they got busy.

An investigation was made, and it was found that some time ago a young man, named W. J. Ferguson, a member of the Y.M.C.A., had lost a watch. The time piece and \$2, it appears, were taken out of his coat, which was left in one of the rooms at the Y.M.C.A. He identified the gold watch taken by the police, as belonging to him. The lad, taken in charge, yesterday, gave the police the name of his pal, and as a result the latter was locked up.

MUST REMOVE THE SNOW.

Police Will See That By-law is Enforced.

BIRTHS AND DEATHS.

Thirty-eight More Births Than Deaths Here in 1910.

Although there were 399 deaths in Kingston during 1910, only 342 of the number were people who actually belonged to this city. Fifty-seven were persons who belonged to district places, and who died in local hospitals.

There were 400 births in Kingston during 1910, and of this number 393 were Kingston offspring, seven being district infants. There were thirteen still-born infants, so that Kingston's total births numbered 380, or thirty-eight more than the death total.

No less than five pairs of twins were born in the city in 1910, one of the number being still-born. There were twelve illegitimate births, six of this number being infants of young women from district places.

A Brockville Councillor.

Allan Donaldson, a former Kingstonian, was elected a councillor for the west ward in Brockville, on Monday. He received the largest majority given a councillor in that town in years. His vote was 311, or 104 more than the second man. This was Mr. Donaldson's entrance into municipal politics, and he is very much pleased over the way the Brockville people expressed their confidence in him.
