**ATTEMPTED TRAIN ROBBERY.**  
Masked Men Again Tried to Hold Up North Pacific Express.  
Seattle, Wash., Jan. 10.—An effort was made shortly after midnight, on Monday, to hold the North Coast Limited train, of the Northern Pacific Railway, a few miles from here. The train is the one which was held up and robbed by two masked bandits last Wednesday.  
There were three men this time. One of the bandits tried to break into the mail car, but found the doors heavily bolted. The other two mounted the engine cab, but were shooed out by the engineer. The descriptions of the men tally closely with those of the other bandits. A posse is following one of the men toward Seattle.

**BABIES STARVED TO DEATH.**  
Doctor Warns Women Against Short Weight Bottles.  
New York, Jan. 10.—How the death of young children may sometimes be due to short measure bottles was explained in an illustrated lecture by Dr. Fritz Reichmann, State Superintendent of weights and measures.  
"Nursing bottles do not always hold the prescribed quantity," said Dr. Reichmann, "and when a mother or a nurse is told by the physician to give forty ounces of milk to a child, no more and no less, the child often does not get this quantity. The reason is that many of the nursing bottles now sold are short, sometimes holding twenty-six per cent. less than the correct quantity.  
Twenty-six per cent. less may mean insufficient nourishment for the child; and result in death. Mothers should be tested at the drug store, so that they will know the exact quantity they feed the child each time."

**CRIPPEN'S CABIN AS HOODOO.**  
Nobody Would Occupy It, So Captain Turns It Into Storeroom.  
New York, Jan. 10.—The late Dr. Crippen's name has 62 on the White Star line, Megantic, that the cabin is being converted into a storeroom. Although it is situated on the shelter deck and provides excellent accommodation for ocean travellers, no one will occupy it now, as its last occupant was the man who was hanged in England for killing Belle Elmore.  
Ethel Le Neve occupied the cabin immediately opposite Crippen's. Both cabins are looked upon as hoodoo, and whenever they have been offered to travellers the question has been asked, "Is that the cabin Dr. Crippen had?" During the voyage just completed the passengers looked upon both cabins as chambers of horror.

**Explodes Old-Sea Myth.**  
For years writers have used the Saragasso sea as a background for their stories—tales of mysterious ships and the graveyard of seaweed where the ships were imprisoned and never heard of again. But these myths concerning the sea have been exploded by the steamer Michael Sars, of the United States Hydrographic Service, sent out from Plymouth a few months ago with a company of scientists aboard.  
The steamer recently came into St. John's, Nfld., after a three months' study of the Saragasso sea, with a mass of seaweed caught in the head waters of the Centre. A large mass of the Cape Verde Islands is greatly exaggerated.  
Scientists of the expedition say that the sea is especially rich in fish and beautiful aquatic insects and small life. They discovered a wonderful transparent shrimp, and eye-like jewels on the end of long tentacles. These eyes of the shrimp are many-faceted and flash a brilliant greenish light.  
**Selling Air Bubbles.**  
Eppin in the Cobalt mining district of Canada, just eight miles south of the Ragged Mountains on the Montreal river, is an extraordinary power plant from which more than 5,000 horse power in compressed air is gotten by making capturing and containing air bubbles. It is the largest, and probably the most powerful, in the world. The compressed air is sold to the mining companies and other concerns at Cobalt for the same amount that gas or electricity is sold in other communities. It is said that it has cut the cost of compressed air in Cobalt in two and made possible the development of the district.
