Experiment in Packing Proved a Decided Success.

Toronto, Jan. 11.—That the experiment made by the department of agriculture in specially packing peaches for the London market was a success is indicated by a paragraph from a year-end review of the London fruit market published in the London Daily Telegraph. It reads as follows:

"Fresh peaches from Ontario arrived at the time when the home-grown crop was exceptionally scarce, and in that account favorable markets were met. Next year large quantities are expected."

Government Called on to Exclude Them.

Liverpool, Jan. 10.—The recent activity here of elders of the Mormon church has led the Bishop of Liverpool and other prominent churchmen to inaugurate a campaign "to safeguard the English home against the trampling efforts of the church which practices and teaches polygamy."

Winnipeg, Jan. 10.—With one or two transcontinental trains stalled in the mountains, with telegraphic communication with the Pacific coast cut off for nearly two days, with the thermometer in the neighborhood of twenty degrees below zero, the whole of Canada from coast to coast is in the grip of the worst storm in the memory of the oldest inhabitant.

It was reported at Canadian Pacific headquarters here, to-day, that every transcontinental train between here and the coast was from seven hours to one day late. Railway officials are facing an unprecedented situation.

TUPPER'S NAVY PLAN

WOULD USE FAST CRUISERS ON GRAIN ROUTES.

He Thinks the Canadian Government is Making a Mistake—He Thinks Cruisers Should be Built.

Montreal, Jan. 10.—Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper related a very interesting conversation he had with Sir Charles Tupper during his six days' sojourn in London.

The ex-Prime Minister told his son that he considered that the government and parliament of Canada were making a very great mistake in the manner they have chosen to assist the mother land by the construction of a Canadian navy.

Sir Charles Tupper declared that his project was one that would not only develop the trade of Canada in time of peace, but it would also assist the empire to which we belong in time of war.

The veteran statesman would construct the most rapid steamers of the cruiser build, and then institute a service between Halifax and Great Britain that would leave New York and American ports far in the rear.

Not Allowed to Land.

Son of Prominent Liverpool Cotton Broker Sent to Ellis Island.

London, Jan. 10.—Much astonishment and indignation were expressed by members of the Liverpool Cotton Exchange, at the fact that the American immigration officers had refused to allow Charles Heape, the thirteen-year-old son of Frederick Heape, a prominent cotton broker and member of the exchange, to land in America.

Experimental Roads.

Toronto, Jan. 10.—Plans for a system of experimental roads between Fredricton and Niagara-on-the-Lake are being prepared by W. A. McLean, provincial road and highway engineer.

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DAILY STEAMSHIP SERVICE

Is Promised Between Trenton and Georgian Bay.

Barrow, Jan. 9.—It is the intention of the Peterboro & Lake Simcoe Navigation Company, upon the completion of the Trent Valley Canal, to have a daily line of steamers between Trenton and Georgian Bay.

The company propose covering the whole waterway connecting Rice Lake and Lake Simcoe. Their steamers on Lake Simcoe will make daily trips between local towns.
