CITY HOCKEY LEAGUE GAMES THIS EVENING.

Regiopolis and Y.I.C.B.A. are to Clash in Senior Series, and Barfield and Irishmen in the Junior.

Two city hockey league games are to be played at the Palace rink this evening. The first game will start at 7.30 between Barfield and Young Irishmen in the junior series. The teams will line up: Barfield—Goal, Ross; point, Morrison; cover, Stanton; rover, Campbell; centre, Murray; wings, Eford and Tidale. Defrauded French-Canadians. Boston, Mass., Jan. 12.—As he stepped from the Montreal express in Manchester, N.H., Joseph De Champlain, president of the New England Investment company, was arrested on a charge of using the mails in a scheme to defraud French-Canadians. He was arraigned before Col. J. C. Crawford, United States commissioner, and was held in \$1,000 bail for next Monday.

It is charged that De Champlain has secured the vast sum of \$2,300 from the French-Canadian working classes in the New England states by his methods. His commissions from this sum are alleged to be \$79,000, and it is alleged that the company declared dividends of \$71,000 through this money and paid \$69,000 of this sum.

Met "Sudden" Deaths. Rio Janeiro, Jan. 12.—According to The Journal de Commercio Jean Canido, leader of the recent revolt in the navy, and forty-four other mutineers have met sudden deaths. Canido succumbed to "gangrene" while a prisoner; twenty-six of his associates died from "sunstroke," while engaged in repairing the fortress on Condraz Island, and eighteen others were "suffocated" in their cells in the prison on Villegaignon Island.
