OFFER OF CHEAP POWER.

Deseronto has made a contract with the Seymour company for power, and will illuminate its streets electrically, and perform such public service as it can with the use of electric energy. Napanee is about to close a contract with the same company, and for all the power it requires. The town has a plant of its own; one it purchased some years ago, at a considerable cost, when its dealings with a private company were not deemed satisfactory. This plant, says rumour, will be purchased by the Seymour company, so that it will not become a burden upon the town. It will be for Kingston to decide whether it can make an arrangement with this same company, not to take any particular quantity of power, or not to put the civic plant out of commission, but to let it sell power at \$25 per year, (twenty-four hours' service), to the wholesale users, and for a definite time. The idea is not to interfere in any way with the city or its plans or consumers, but to incur all the cost of connecting Kingston with its transmission lines, and giving the larger users of power the opportunity they have not at present. It is a proposition that will stand consideration, and now, as it will take a year to build the lines and work should be begun upon them as soon as possible.

ATTACK ON IDLE RICH.

The Literary Digest copies from the conservative press of England the criticism they offered upon Lloyd-George. On one occasion he referred to the millions of American dollars that had been contributed as marriage portions and which went to the support of certain houses of the nobility that were tottering, before these alliances, to the fall. The directness of the chancellor's assault should have put it beyond question to whom he referred, and yet the response comes from some who were not embraced in his category of the idle rich.

It is of no consequence what Lloyd-George's early life may have been. He does not disguise the fact that he rose from the people, that he knows what it is to be poor. What his origin is does not affect the situation. Nor does it disprove the merits of the man, and minimize the ability with which he has risen to the highest post of responsibility under the premier and that he may be the next premier of England. Disraeli was one of the despised race when he entered the British parliament, but he lived down all prejudices and demanded the recognition of the nation by the forcefulness of his character. Lloyd-George is another Disraeli, but in some respects he is a more brilliant man.

All honour to the members of the nobility who are not idle though they are rich, who busy themselves in every way they can, who are a power in the civil and national life, who are giving of their substance and themselves in behalf of every worthy cause. The chancellor of the exchequer, that most caustic individual, is not offensive to any one, and he need not care about the stabs of the Duke of Marlborough for they by no means, and in no degree, reflect public opinion. The duke got \$10,000,000 with his hands some wife, one of the Vanderbilts, but how much he deserved it may be imagined when, according to rumour, a while ago royalty itself was invited to bring about a restoration of domestic peace.

STORY WITH A MORAL.

A new phase has been given to the discussion upon the Panama canal and the right of the United States to fortify it for defence purposes. It has been a question for some time on which the members of congress have divided, whether the United States fortify the canal, or whether, if thus disposed, it had a right to do so under the treaty it had negotiated. The canal was to be neutral. Though cost of hundreds of millions it was to be accessible by the other powers.

Mr. Forsaker, a senator from Ohio, now addresses Mr. Tall, publicly, on the subject, and quotes from an interview he had with the late Mr. Hay, secretary of state some years ago. Lord Lansdowne, the foreign secretary in the Balfour government, had communicated the disapproval of the British government with regard to a treaty, in which fortification was provided for. Later he had intimated that there would not be any advantage in going further with the treaty pending a settlement of outstanding issues between Canada and the United States. Mr. Forsaker claims that he got busy with the question and suggested a phrasing of certain paragraphs of the proposed treaty so that the object aimed at by the United States would be attained indirectly.

TO REBUILD CHURCH

ODESSA METHODIST EDIFICE TO BE REARED AGAIN.

Cost Will be \$15,000—Will be Ready Next December—Meeting of the Township Council.

Odessa, Jan. 11.—The trustees of the Methodist church, met to-day and concluded to proceed at once toward the erection of another in its stead, to cost, when finished, about fifteen thousand dollars. The congregation, in the meantime, has been fortunate in securing the use of the Salvation Army hall, (it not being used by the army), for their services until such time as their new church is ready, about next Christmas.

The severe snow storms of late have rather "rattled" the mail contractor, but he manages to get around occasionally, but we can stand it as we are used to waiting. We do get weary waiting, at least two nights in the week, though they are Whig nights.

A successful revival service is still being carried on by the Free Methodist people in their cosy little church, conducted by Rev. R. Babcock.

At the annual meeting of Odessa public library, William Dougherty was elected president for the year.

At the first meeting of the township council the Napanee Beaver was given the printing for the ensuing year. The following appointments were made: S. W. Clark, assessor; John H. Gardiner and R. Bennett, auditors; Dr. Mabce, on health board; George Ferguson, overseer township property. Sessions were held for the last Monday in each month.

George Hartman has sold his property here and moved to the Robin Mountain place to Hartman Snider, of this concession, and the A. E. Timmerman farm to Chester Snider, of Odessa.

LONDON PRESS OPINIONS

On Reciprocity Between Canada and United States.
London, Jan. 12.—The London press continues to discuss the prospects for a revival of the arbitration treaty between Great Britain and the U. S. The Daily Chronicle thinks that present conditions are more favorable than in 1897. President Taft, it says, stands well with the senate, and is acting prudently by bringing the senate into an informal conference. The Chronicle adds that there could be no nobler celebration of the hundred years' peace between Great Britain and the U.S. than the conclusion of such a treaty which would set the world a shining example.

The Morning Post considers the idea attractive, but discards the prospect of the United States entangling Canada in a commercial treaty. I say that the greatest obstacle to American aims in Canada is the policy of imperial reciprocity, but once Canada became thus entangled "it might be easy for American diplomacy which never has been exactly scrupulous, to argue afterwards that Canada could not make an arrangement of mutual preference with Great Britain consistently with her American commitments. Then," continues the paper, "the dispute would go for arbitration to an umpire representing other foreign interests, not sympathetic to the British aim."

The Post says that it is an unpalatable pity that Mr. Balfour delayed tariff reform and imperial preference, and argues that an arbitration treaty might have the effect of still further delaying these matters.

Daily Papers in West.

Winnipeg, Jan. 12.—The way western daily newspapers thrive is one of the marvels of the west. Small cities, which could barely support a couple of little dailies in the east have often ten flourishing daily papers. They get the news, too, and pay big sums for it. The latest addition to the newspapers of the west is The Province, a conservative morning daily in Regina. The Leader, the liberal paper, has retailed by starting an evening edition as well. Regina, with a population of barely fifteen thousand, has two morning papers and two evening papers. Leithridge has a new conservative daily, the News.

COSTLY TOILET PAPER

Was Sent to the Penitentiary at Kingston.

Ottawa, Jan. 12.—That paper, and some of it by no means of a cheap grade, found its way to Kingston penitentiary, is shown in the blue book which gives details of the evidence taken in connection with printing bureau irregularities. The Citizen says: "One of the schemes employed by the late superintendent of stationery to make his 'rake-off' was by the purchasing of an expensive toilet paper from an American firm. The evidence shows that thousands of rolls of the most costly paper were sent to the penitentiaries at Kingston and Dorchester, N.B., and to the various militia camps. This was done evidently to conceal the fact that such great quantities of the high grade paper were bought, instead of cheaper lines, as had the high grade stuff been used in the departments here it would have been noticed."
