**DE ALCOHOLIZED LIQUORS.**

The First Brewery Will be Started at Grimsby.

London, Jan. 13.—Chemist Overbeck, who announced lately that he had discovered how to make an alcohol without fermentation, has patented a process for de-alcoholizing malt liquors. A company is being formed to operate under the patent. The first brewery will be started shortly at Grimsby.

Mr. Overbeck says the method is completely successful. It prevents beer from being intoxicating, while leaving the flavor, sparkle and palatability unimpaired.

Fifty-two experts tasted the de-alcoholized beverages and more than half of them were unable to distinguish between them and those containing alcohol. Others detected a subtle difference, which would not be apparent to the average taster. The process is applicable to all beers, and is well possible for teetotalers to drink Bass or familiar ales without breaking the pledge. The new company proposes to buy famous brands, de-alcoholize them and put them on the market with the familiar labels attached to designate that they are not intoxicating.

Mr. Overbeck's discovery has another side. He says that every hoghead of beer de-alcoholized by his process will yield about three gallons of proof spirit. This forms an excellent, mild whiskey, which can be sold as such. It burns clearly and steadily without fumes. If de-alcoholized beer becomes general spirits will be produced in such quantities as would supply the market. It could then be used the same as petrol, which might be ousted from the market. Whiskey-driven automobiles, auto-boats and aeroplanes are a possibility of the near future.

**LOOKING FOR HER LOVER.**

A Toronto Girl Spent Hours Trying to Locate Him.

London, Ont., Jan. 13.—For hours, yesterday, a pretty little Toronto girl haunted the Grand Trunk station looking for a young farmer from New Sarum, near St. Thomas, to whom she was to have been married in the latter city yesterday. But the lover came not.

Miss Edna Gould, the young lady, missed the proper connection at Toronto for New Sarum, and came on to London instead. From here she telephoned New Sarum, but was unable to locate her avain, who had purchased a ticket for London, and had left the village.

She met all the trains, but he did not appear. Terrified that he might think she had flied him, and conjuring up all manner of dire possibilities, she left for St. Thomas in the afternoon to locate the missed and missing lover and have the knot tied.

**PEOPLE DO NOT REALIZE**

The Deep Concern Felt in Japan Over Pacific Laws.

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 13.—Japan's first official protest against proposed anti-Japanese legislation in the United States comes in the form of a letter from Consul-General Matsuzo Nagai, at San Francisco, to Senator Leroy Wright, chairman of the senate committee on federal relations.

"I think the people of this state hardly realize the deep concern felt in Japan on this subject," says the consul-general. "Discrimination at this time would be particularly surprising to the Japanese people in view of the efforts which have been made during the past two years to cultivate the good-will of the American people and to prove to them the sincerity of Japanese good-will."

**HALIFAX NAVAL COLLEGE.**

Temporary Building is Being Fitted Up.

Halifax, Jan. 12.—The painting and finishing touches are being applied to the interior of the naval hospital building in the dockyard, which will be used temporarily for naval college purposes. It will begin work on January 19th with twenty-one cadets. By next year it is expected that the permanent buildings on the Admiralty house grounds will be ready.

Capt. Martin, the senior naval officer of the dockyard, will be the captain of the college. B. S. Hartley being director of studies. Other members of the college staff are: Lieut. Nixon, cadetmaster; Lieut. Bartlett, staff paymaster; Lieut. Young and the acting naval instructor will be F. Robinson.

**AN INDIAN WORK OF ART.**

Government May Have it for \$100, or \$40 and Letter.

Ottawa, Jan. 13.—The geological survey is negotiating for the purchase of an immense painting now at the department of Indian Affairs, the owner of which is "Bob" of the Tenshah band of Indians at Alberni, B.C. The painting is a representation of the legends connected with "Bob's" ancestors, and was used at a recent "Potluch" or celebration by the Tenshah tribe at Alberni. It is the work of an uneducated member of the tribe, and is done on a big sheet of canvas about sixteen feet long and eight feet high.

A. W. Neill, the agent at Alberni, wrote in sending the painting that "Bob" was willing to accept \$100 for it, or \$40 and a letter from the department.

**Lost Voice and Got It Back.**

Chatham, Jan. 13.—Miss Anna Parsons, of McKay's Corners, who is attending school in Ridgeway, fell at the skating rink a couple of weeks ago and was rendered unconscious. She remained in that condition for some time, and afterwards suffered from convulsions. When she recovered from her injuries it was found that she had lost her voice.

Yesterday, while walking to a neighbor's house, she slipped and fell again. The shock of the second fall caused her voice to return, and she is now fully recovered from her temporary affliction.

**Colbit Police Report.**

Colbit, Jan. 13.—Chief of Police Burke's report handed to the town council, last night, shows receipts from fines of \$11,490, for the past year. The surplus over police cost expenses, officers, salaries, etc., was \$4,900, giving Colbit the record of being the only municipality in the province whose police department shows a profit.

The convictions numbered 458, 200 persons did time for violation of the liquor license act, and 127 were fined for the same offence.

**King Gustav Fell Off Horse.**

Stockholm, Jan. 13.—A consultation of eminent physicians was held, yesterday, to determine whether an operation is necessary upon King Gustav, of Sweden, as a result of the injuries he received in a recent fall from his horse while hunting. Fear of injury to the heart and of consequent paralysis leads to the belief that an operation may be necessary, although this will be avoided if possible. A slight improvement in the monarch's condition was noted to-day.


**To Oppose Home Rule.**

Belfast, Jan. 13.—The first steps were taken here, yesterday, to revive the Ulster unionist fight, which were largely responsible for the successful movement against Gladstone's home rule bill of 1886. A meeting, presided over by Lord Templemore, called on the surviving presidents and secretaries to arrange to re-organize the clubs to work to their utmost to oppose home rule.

**Forty Per Cent Die.**

Washington, Jan. 13.—Official reports to the state department indicate that the plague situation at Harbin, Manchuria, is very serious. During the last fifteen days a total of 800 deaths have been reported. New cases have occurred at the rate of 100 daily, with a mortality of forty per cent.
