OF THE ESTATE OF THE LATE COUNT TOLSTOI.

Russian En Route to New York to Offer Yasnaya Polyana to Carnegie or Rockefeller—Appeal to Their Generosity.

New York, Jan. 13.—Michael Alexan- drovitch Kustinsky, a Russian, will arrive here next week with a project for which he hopes to obtain the support of American millionaires.

M. Kustinsky, who passed through Berlin on his way to Liverpool this week, says that he has been commissioned by the sons of the late Count Tolstoi to visit the United States and effect the sale of the famous Yasnaya Polyana estate for the purpose of retaining it in its original form as a Tolstoi memorial.

It is not intended that the estate shall be a mere museum, but that it shall be converted into a great educational establishment bearing the philosopher's name and inculcating the doctrines to which Tolstoi was devoted, especially peace. The memorial to be government international committee appointed by the purchasers.

It was first proposed to submit the project to the Russian duma, but the Tolstoi family feared that such a procedure would subject the enterprise to so much acrimonious discussion, ending in possible defeat, that they decided, instead, to appeal to the generosity of American millionaires.

Messrs. Carnegie and Rockefeller are likely to be the first to have an opportunity of thus honoring the great Russian's name.

**DE ALCOHOLIZED LIQUORS.**

The First Brewery Will be Started at Grimsby.

London, Jan. 13.—Chemist Overbeck, who announced lately that he had discovered how to make a alcohol without fermentation, has patented a process for de-alcoholizing malt liquors. A company is being formed to operate under the patent. The first brewery will be started shortly at Grimsby. Mr. Overbeck says the method is completely successful. It prevents beer from being intoxicating, while leaving the flavor, sparkle and palatability unimpaired.

Fifty-two experts tasted the de-alcoholized beverages and more than half of them were unable to distinguish between them and those containing alcohol. Others detected a subtle difference, which would not be apparent to the average taster. The process is applicable to all beers, and is will be possible for teetotallers to drink Bass or familiar ales without breaking the pledge. The new company proposes to buy famous brands, de-alcoholize them and put them on the market with the familiar labels attached to designate that they are not intoxicating.

Mr. Overbeck's discovery has another side. He says that every horsehead will yield about three gallons of proof spirit. This forms an excellent, mild whiskey, which can be sold as such. It burns clearly and steadily without fumes. If de-alcoholized beer becomes general spirits will be produced in such quantities as would supply the market. It could then be used as petrol, which might be ousted from the market. Whiskey-driven automobiles, auto-boats and aeroplanes are a possibility of the near future.
