

It is quite likely that the machinery will need considerable repairing before it can be used next season and you'll never find a better time than during some idle winter day to inspect it. Any missing or broken part hould be replaced or repaired; taps oiled and tightened-which prevents loss or rust-and all dust, grime or dirt oil carefully wiped off the bearings and gearing. With this, and a thorough oiling of each piece and part, there will be no rust form during the winter and the machinery is ready to run right out when the rush seaton comes on next spring-at a period when one is usually in such a rush that he will not stop to make the much-needed repairs.

Fattening Lambs.

A good, warm shed without drafts and open on one side with boards just | low enough to allow lambs to go out and in is an ideal house for fattening them. The inside may be arranged so that the feed racks will serve as partitions and the lambs separated so that there will be about twenty-five to forty in a bunch. Keep them well bedded with clean straw and allow no dampness or filth in their sleeping places, for sheep will not thrive and make good gains unless they are kept clean

Feed whole oats, corn and clover and you will find it a very desirable ra-

Selling the Pig Crop-

The best time to market the pig crop is usually when they are ready for the butcher, and it seldom pays to hold them for an advance of the market. There is no little expense connected with holding fat animals for a raise in the market, and in many instances the market declines instead of advances. When pigs are being fed in carload lots they should not be driven to the cars, unless the distance is short, but loaded into. waggons and hauled. It pays to load them in uniform bunches and assorted as to size and condition. It is the unfinished runty pigs that knock more off from the sale of the whole bunch than they will bring themselves. Fither sell them in a separate lot or keep them away from the better fitted

Poultry Notes.

A subscriber writes: It is not wise winter and spring. It often causes croup and catarrh. The fumes from the lime irritate the nricous membrane of the nasal passage and make it very tender. The fumes also cause the nasal fluid to flow extensively and make the eyes water. When the chickens are in this condition, they contract colds, which often terminate in roup, catarrh and other troubles. One experienced poultry raiser advises the beginner to give the birds all they can do during the day, but never all they can eat. Leave the filling of their crops till night. This will keep them healthy and prevent them from getting into the bad habit

Watch the pullets after they have matured and moulted, and mark the one that lays first. The chances are that she will lay well during the winter. If she does, she should be put in the breeding pen in the spring. Her off-spring will be early and prolific

There is no ben dream more attractive to the inexperienced than the keeping of three to eight varieties, of poultry and selling breeding stock and eggs for hatching-and no proposition that will wreck one's finances nore quickly and completely. I would advise every dreamer to keep his money Keeping several varieties of fowls is like trying to engage in several kinds of business at once-and usually ends the same. One variety of bens is all any one should attempt to breed. more kinds of poultry are desired, add ducks, geese, turkeys or pigeons... Get one variety of poultry and stick to it.


