

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NEW YORK HORSE CARS.

Come all ye who can remember the turtle-backed horse cars in Sixth avenue which swung round on a peg and went back merrily uptown-all ye who, mind all the joys of an ancient New York-and drop a tear at the passing of the crosstown horse cars in Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets. Gone are the tinkling bells which made of this crosstown line the memory of an Alpine cowpasture, or of level stretch in uttermost Connecticut. This line of cars cut across the most varied neighborhoods, the most widely contrasting centres of population. In the districts by the rivers its "mellow village chime" sounded amid the small paned windows of little shops and echoed along the dingy hallways of poor tenements. But, as the cars went from Lexington avenue through the great, red-hot, pulsing heat of New York, and beyond bright Broadway, the little, rocking cars made a queer picture in the roar and blaze of the big modern town; this winter, as they pushed through the drifted snow untackled by the former football hero, the horses might have been mistaken for reindeer and the drivers for strayed effigies of Santa Claus. But now, no more. Storage batteries and new cars brush away another landmark grown dear to them that can remember as far back as when

that hoary monument, the Madison Square Garden, was a new building acclaimed as a triumpn of modern adaptability in architecture; even further back, when horse cars still slipped and groaned along Broadway, or rather, when the Broadway horse cars ran in any other street than the thoroughfare whose name they bore.
