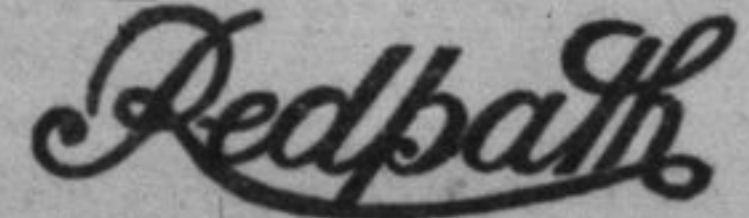

## THE CITY COUNCIL

### AUTHORIZED TENDERS FOR NEW STREET LAMPS.

It Received Kingston's Tax Exemption Schedule, Which Amounts to \$3,800,000—Appointed a Publicity Committee.

The city council held its first regular session of the year last evening. Some important business was transacted. The following is a summary:— It decided to ask the Ontario legislature to change the time of the Kingston municipal election to the first Monday in February.

It referred to the finance committee for consideration and report a schedule of Kingston's exempted property. It gave the light, heat and power committee authority to call for tenders for new magnetite lamps for street lighting.

It appointed publicity committee to make Kingston better known throughout the country.

It instructed the finance committee to arrange for a deputation to go to Ottawa to interview the minister of marine regarding the dredging of the lower harbor.

In attendance at the meeting were Mayor Graham and Aids, Armstrong, Bailey, Carson, Couper, Clugston, Elliott, Fair, Fraser, Givens, Hanley, Hart, Hoag, Kerr, Linton, McCann, McCarthy, Shaw and Toye.

These communications were read:— William Holder re quarry on Montreal street.

Dr. W. J. Morgan, making application to be appointed veterinary surgeon for the fire department.

The Stronglight Box Co., Ltd., of Ottawa, asking what inducements Kingston would offer for the establishment of a branch factory here.

Charles Bedore and others asking that an arc light be placed on Nelson street.

Kingston's Exempted Property. In accordance with instructions, City Clerk Sands presented a statement showing the property in Kingston exempted from taxation, and amounting to over \$3,800,000. The following is a summary of the exemptions:

Exempted by city by-law of all but school taxes: Montreal Transportation company, \$106,200; Cereals; Limited, \$25,000; Dominion Textile company, \$50,000; Isomotive works, \$226,580; street railway, \$31,250; James Richardson & Sons, \$24,000; Kingston Ship-building company, \$100,000; Wormwith Piano company, \$30,000; total, \$733,330.

Summary of exemptions by statute of all but local improvement tax: Dominion government property, \$306,100; corporation property, \$1,006,800; educational institutions, \$756,950; charitable institutions, \$468,300; churches, \$531,400; total, \$3,969,550. Total exemptions, \$3,969,550.

It was decided, on motion of Ald. Givens, seconded by Ald. Carson, to refer the exemption schedule to the finance committee for consideration and report, and to have it printed and a copy sent to each member of council. Ald. Givens will appear before the finance committee to state his views and recommend what the council should do. The matter was brought up in view of an article in the Financial Post, showing that Kingston stood third highest among the cities of Ontario in regard to exempted property.

Per capita, the exemptions in Kingston was equal to \$179.11. In Toronto it was \$98.57, and in Belleville, \$86. Ald. Givens said it was of vital importance to the city that this matter should be carefully gone into.

The Finance Report. These recommendations of the finance committee were adopted:— That an application be made to the Dominion government for dredging the harbor below the Cataract bridge, plan of the same to be prepared by the city engineer, and the member for Kingston be asked to lay the same before the minister, and to arrange for a conference with the delegation of this council regarding the same.

That the present financial arrangement between the Bank of British North America and the corporation of the city of Kingston be renewed for another period of three years upon the same terms, viz, five per cent. on advances, and four per cent. upon credit balances.

That this municipality is in favor of an act to incorporate the Ottawa, Smith's Falls and Kingston Electric Railway company.

That the following amounts be placed to the credit of the following committees as temporary appropriations: Board of works, \$3,000; fire and light, \$1,000; city property, \$500; printing, \$1,000; contingencies, \$350.

That the mayor and city treasurer be instructed to renew the insurance on city property when it becomes due until further orders.

New Street Lights. The council empowered the light, heat and power committee to call for tenders for new lamps for street lighting.

Aids, Couper and Hoag asked for information in regard to this matter. The former wanted to know if the lamps it was proposed to purchase were recognized as good ones.

Ald. Elliott replied that it was proposed to purchase the Magnetite lamp, which was the best on the market. He read a list of places that had recently installed the Magnetite lamp—Winnipeg, Vancouver and Montreal being three of the cities that had purchased them in large numbers.

The lamp was much stronger and more economical than the lamps in use here now.

Ald. Givens said he had made enquiry regarding the Magnetite lamp, and found it was the latest and best that could be secured.

Ald. Couper brought up the matter of arranging swimming baths for the people and of securing play grounds for the uptown children. He had referred these questions to committees last year. Ald. Kent, chairman of parks, promised to secure for these questions the consideration of his committee.

The council gave the street lighting and the electric extension but have their third reading.

Mayor Graham asked that the council authorize the payment of Board

of Works employees every week during the winter instead of every fortnight. On motion of Ald. Clugston and Toye, the authorization was made. On motion of Aids, Kent and Hoag, the finance committee was instructed to arrange for the sending of a deputation to interview the minister of marine with regard to the dredging of the lower harbor.

Ald. Shaw was instrumental in having a publicity committee appointed. This resolution moved by himself and seconded by Ald. Bailey was adopted. That in order to promote the interests of the city and in order that its advantages may become better understood by the people of the county, a publicity committee be appointed to devise ways and means, whereby this purpose may be better accomplished, the committee to be composed of the mover and second and Aids, McCann, Couper and Fraser.

Ald. Shaw said that this committee need be under no expense for the present. There was much it could do in the way of advertising Kingston.

Ald. Elliott said that one of the first things the committee might do was to have the penitentiary called by its right name. It was the Portsmouth penitentiary, and not the Kingston.

Ald. Shaw's publicity committee was sanctioned by the council, and wished all kinds of luck.

A. H. Scouten, postmaster of Riding Mountain, Man., arrived in the city, on Monday, to renew old acquaintances, after an absence of over thirty years. He was anticipating a pleasant visit with George H. During the short time in which he had at his disposal to look around, he found a great many changes, in faces and places, and was glad to see that the old Limestone city was progressing favorably. Mr. Scouten has been a constant reader of the Whig for many years. It is hoped he may find his daughter on the road to recovery by the time he reaches home.
