**PLAN A BIG MERGER**  
OF FIVE LAKE TRANSPORTATION COMPANIES.

Most of Stockholders in Companies Are Residents of Syracuse—The Fleets Owned Represent Actual Investment of More Than \$6,000,000.

Syracuse, N. Y., Jan. 18.—Plans for the merging of five Great Lakes Transportation companies, all of which are controlled by Syracuse capital, into a single big corporation, are now being perfected.

The companies, namely the United States Transportation company, the L. C. Smith Transportation company, the Standard Steamship company, the American Steamship company and the H. S. Wilkinson Transportation company, have a fleet of twenty-five freighters, representing actual investments of more than \$6,000,000 and comprising in size and capacity a line second only to the fleet of the United States Steel company.

Horace S. Wilkinson, of this city, and the estate of the late Lyman O. Smith are the biggest individual stockholders in each of the companies and many Syracusans are financially interested. Mr. Wilkinson and Mr. Smith were the organizers of each of the companies.

By the consolidation it is expected that a big yearly saving will be effected and the management of the transportation business placed upon a sounder basis than ever before. The administration and overhead expenses of four of the companies will be once wiped out. The saving in insurance will also be an enormous item.

The vessels of the consolidated company will be the most modern plying the lakes, a number being of modern type with fuller carrying capacity than any other fleet. For example, in a single trip the boats are capable of conveying between 175,000 and 200,000 tons of iron ore. Thirteen of the twenty-one boats are of the maximum tonnage permitted, 10,000 tons, and the others are 5,000 to \$6,500 tons capacity each.

The name of the new company has not been selected. The United States Transportation company is the biggest of the five, having thirteen boats. The L. C. Smith company has four, the H. S. Wilkinson company two and the American and Standard companies one each.

**LOST THROUGH NEGLECT.**

**The Quebec Bridge Guarantee Bond Uncollected.**  
Ottawa, Jan. 17.—That a guarantee bond of \$100,000, held by the Quebec Bridge company against the United States Fidelity & Guarantee company, in security for the contract for the erection of the Quebec Bridge by the Phoenix Bridge company, was forfeited after the collapse of the bridge, because of failure on the part of the Quebec Bridge company to promptly notify the Guarantee company of the fact by the Phoenix Bridge company, is the rather startling disclosure made in a return presented to parliament yesterday by the Minister of Railways, Hon. George P. Graham.

The fact was incidentally brought out in the correspondence included in the return which deals with the settlement effected by the government with the Phoenix Bridge company, on the basis of a cash payment of \$100,000 by the company, and surrender of the government of all iron and steel work put into the collapsed bridge together with all materials delivered at the bridge and intended for use in construction.

It would seem that this failure to collect the \$100,000 from the Guarantee company was the either through carelessness on the part of some official or officials of the Quebec Bridge company, or else possibly to something that might be referred to in even stronger terms.

**CONSERVATION CONVENTION.**

**Hon. Clifford Sifton Tells of the Damming Project.**  
Quebec, Jan. 17.—The principal part of opening proceedings of the forestry conservation convention was the address of the chairman, Hon. Clifford Sifton, who spoke in part as follows: "One of the most important propositions which the conservation commission has had to deal with was to dam the St. Lawrence river. The stand taken was in opposition to the project, on a variety of grounds set forth in a memorial presented to the international waterways commission, and it is satisfactory to know that the result of the opposition manifested by other public bodies as well as our commission, has been to prevent the project from being authorized, and from present appearance, it seems unlikely that persons seeking authority will be empowered by the United States congress to carry out their plans without the consent of the Canadian government. If this be correct, it is quite clear that nothing will be done until full opportunity is given for the thorough discussion of the project."

**TO DEEPEN THE BURLINGTON.**

**Hamilton is Preparing for Welland Canal Boom.**  
Hamilton, Jan. 17.—This city is already looking forward to the effect of a flow of business from the new Welland canal, and City Engineer McCullum, this morning, reported that the work of deepening the Burlington canal and widening the lake entrance to four hundred feet would cost three-quarters of a million dollars.

**Bank Act Revision.**

Ottawa, Jan. 17.—It is understood that the government will be requested by members of parliament, irrespective of party to defer the revision of the bank act until next session. The present bank charters expire on July 1st next, but they can be renewed for a year and the decennial revisions can hereafter date from 1912. The probability of a royal commission being appointed to examine into the history and affairs of the Farmers' Bank and the growing demand for more efficient inspection under the bill introduced by Mr. Fielding quite unsatisfactory. A petition addressed to the minister of finance is being circulated and numerous signed by the members of parliament.

**Extortionist Gets Two Years.**

Berlin, Jan. 17.—Wilhelm Fielder, of Stenstedter, Silisia, was taken to prison, yesterday, to serve two years hard labor for attempting to blackmail Countess Mariel Von Scher-Tross, daughter of Henry White, former U. S. ambassador to France. Fielder, after unsuccessfully attempting to extort money from the countess, threatened to blow up her place with dynamite unless she deposited a large sum in a hiding place he designated.

**Adopt Anti-Sunday Labor Policy.**

Adelaide, N.S.W., Jan. 18.—The wharf lumper here refused to unload a mail steamer on Sunday, although offered three shillings an hour. The action of the union was taken in pursuance of the policy to abolish, as far as possible, Sunday labor.

**DRINK PARTED THEM**  
A WIFE LEFT HER HOME RATHER SUDDENLY.

**It is Stated That Hubby Came Home and Found Door Locked—House of Too Much Trouble in the North End of the City.**

According to the story which is going the rounds, a young married man, living in the north end of the city has been having a heap of trouble of late, but it is alleged that he has brought it all on himself, through over indulgence in strong drink.

It appears that for some time the young fellow has been on quite a spree and that his wife has been doing everything possible, in an endeavor to get him on the "water-wagon." Perhaps Inspector Wright's "prohibited list" would have served the bill, all right; but at any rate it would have been no harm to have given it a test.

However, to cut the story short, the wife got tired of seeing hubby come home night after night, in such an awful condition, and it is alleged that on Monday afternoon, she took "French leave," and that hubby is now keeping "bachelor" quarters.

People living in the vicinity of the little homestead noticed that on Monday night, the husband was brought home by some kind friend, who secured a hand sleigh for the trip. **GOOD ROADS WORK.**

**Government May Share the Cost of Maintenance.**

Toronto, Jan. 18.—The enlargement of the Ontario government's "Good Roads Scheme," a rounding out of the movement by a policy of maintaining the highways, will, it is believed, be the next step in the direction of securing for the province a system of roads second to none.

The "Good Roads Scheme," inaugurated by the government several years ago has, says the Globe, proved a decided success, and as a result a number of counties are now in possession of road systems approaching completion. Under the agreement with the counties the government bears a third of the cost of constructing the roads, but the responsibility and cost of maintenance have been left to the counties. The government's direct association with the roads covers upon the completion of the construction mapped out for the county.

This arrangement is not fully satisfactory, and it is felt that if the maintenance of the roads after they have been constructed at such great cost is left entirely to the counties some of the highways will be allowed to fall into a state of neglect. The scheme which it is proposed to adopt is in a sense a continuation of the one under which the roads are constructed, the shouldering by the provincial treasury of a proportion of the cost. By doing so the government could exercise supervision over the roads and keep them always "up to the mark."

**HE CAN NOW RETIRE.**

**A Man Came to Canada and Struck it Rich.**  
Ottawa, Jan. 18.—To emigrate to Canada from over the border ten years ago and invest \$3,000 in Canadian farm lands and to be able to retire from active life with \$400,000 in cold, hard number one Canadian dollars safely tucked away as a result of his investment, is the splendid manner in which the Goddess of Fortune has smiled on E. Bawash, of Alis, Alta. Mr. Bawash was fortunate enough to close his farm ten years ago on the very spot that the C.N.R. at present required for their divisional point on their road, through the Rockies. Mr. Bawash is a native of North Dakota, and with his sister, Miss A. Bawash, and legal adviser is in Ottawa in connection with the transfer of his property to a town-site company. Afterwards he proposes to take a trip to the old land.

The marriage of Miss Birdie Breece, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Breece to William Foley, was solemnized at noon, on January 11th, at the residence of the bride's parents, Lyndhurst.

Hannah Richardson, Belleville, an old offender, stole \$5 and was remanded for sentence.

**HOPE TO END NEGOTIATIONS**  
In Washington for Reciprocity Next Saturday.

Washington, Jan. 18.—The most interesting thing about the reciprocity negotiations here so far has been the utter lack of interest shown in them by the general public. Beyond a few paragraphs at the opening of the negotiations, the local papers have not even mentioned the subject. Neither in the hotels, on the streets, nor in the senate or house of Representatives is the subject discussed or even alluded to unless some politician who in the past has been identified with it be button-holed and quickly questioned. It is hoped that the negotiations will end by Saturday.

**Purchased Sugar of Lead.**

Wheeling, W.Va., Jan. 18.—Dr. J. W. Meyers, a Wheeling physician, on the witness stand in the case of Mrs. Laura Farnsworth Schenk, this afternoon, testified that Mrs. Laura Schenk had purchased sugar of lead from him and had tried to buy arsenic, but he refused to sell it to her.

He swore that she told him she had already purchased some from another doctor, but needed more.


