ONE WOMAN DELIBERATELY SHOT ANOTHER DEAD. Mrs. Binford, a Saleslady in a Department Store, the Victim—No Cause for the Killing Known. Fort Worth, Tex., Jan. 18.—Shooting with coolness and steady aim, Mrs. T. M. Brooks, wife of a prominent attorney, fired five bullets into the body of Mrs. Mary Binford in a crowded department store, yesterday. Each shot struck the victim and Mrs. Binford died almost instantly.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead or a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister in each of three years. A quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$8.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a cross, within the time required to earn homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a cross, within the time required to earn homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra. W. W. One herd of 1,100 went over a bank and only the heroism of three herdsmen saved them all from suffocation. As it was, fifty were dead.

Washington, Jan. 18.—During the past year 1,220 offenders against the postal regulations of the United States were convicted and are now serving terms in penitentiaries and several of the most notorious gangsters, postoffice robbers, get-rich-quick scheme promoters and gold brick men have been lodged behind the bars, according to the annual report of R. S. Sharp, chief inspector of the department.

A cow dropped from exhaustion and the farmer ran to the rescue, expecting to see her trampled. Instead, the horses eagerly began licking her hide.
