TWO MEALS EACH DAY

DR. J. S. HOOKER GIVES RECIPE FOR HEALTH.

An Occasional Fast Also Necessary—Best of Mind and Plenty of Fresh Air.

London, Eng., Jan. 18.—Two meals a day and an occasional fast was the recipe for health and long life given by Dr. J. S. Hooker in a lecture before the Psycho-Therapeutic society at Caxton Hall.

"In the two meals a day plan," he said, "lies a great preventive of catarrhs, influenza, and a host of other diseases under the form of dyspepsia, gout and liver affections. The best time for these two meals will depend to some extent on circumstances, but I believe if it were possible for us to take our first meal at eleven or twelve o'clock and our second at six or seven o'clock in the evening we should be all the better for it."

"I myself have not had a cold for years, and am actually feeling younger rather than older as the days go on. The fasting cure is essentially a cleansing process, and is especially good for such diseases as gout, rheumatism, dyspepsia, internal troubles and growths, diabetes, obesity, paralysis, blood diseases of all kinds, and skin affections."

"But certain conditions are advised. These are rest of mind, no business, healthy surroundings in which plenty of fresh air can be obtained, correct breathing in the open air, and after the first week, at all events for most patients, a good deal of bodily rest. No long fast should be undertaken at all without medical inspection first, and medical watching."

HOME RULE MEASURE.

More whiskey is being smuggled into north country around Cobalt, by ingenious methods.

The marriage of Count De Lesseps to Miss Mackenzie of Toronto has been set for January 25th.

John Redmond declares that the veto power of the lords must be abolished before the coronation.

The report of the Presbyterian church in Canada for the last year shows a large increase in givings.

At Providence, R.I., Henry F. Lippitt, republican, was elected U. S. senator, to succeed Nelson W. Aldrich.

It is rumored that an allied steamship company is being formed at Liverpool with a capital of two million.

Bishop Wm. Paret, of the Protestant Episcopal church, died at Baltimore, on Wednesday, after a long illness.

At Niagara Falls, Ont., border police are watching for the man accused of dynamiting the Los Angeles Times building.

Grand Trunk railway system traffic earnings from January 8th to 14th, 1911: 1911, \$795,391; 1910, \$725,020; increase, \$70,376.

A serious epidemic of typhoid fever threatens Ottawa. Within the past forty-eight hours over fifty cases of fever have been reported.

J. M. McQueen and government surveyors reached Ottawa, on Wednesday after a remarkable northern adventure tramping thousands of miles.

The St. John, N.B. county council, adopted the principle of a prison farm for the prisoners, but no action was taken to work out the matter.

E. J. Moore, a London, Ont., book-keeper, has been convicted of bigamy. In 1908 he married Miss Alvina Porter, having at the time a wife in England.

Dependent over continued ill-health, Frederick Hoag, a prominent Welland farmer, committed suicide Wednesday morning, by shooting himself through the heart.

The Brunswick Postmasters' Association, in an annual session at St. John, N.B., decided to send a delegation to Ottawa to interview the government in regard to better salaries.

Dr. William J. Furness, a well-known physician, of Harlem, N.Y., was instantly killed by the fall of his automobile through an elevator shaft in the garage.

William and Herbert Walker, the fishermen adrift on a Lake Huron ice floe since Tuesday morning, were rescued Wednesday and taken to Port Huron on the tug Vigor.

Holland has decided to withdraw, with a view to its modification, the defence scheme, one of the principal objects of which was to make Flaushing the Gibraltar of the north.

Bishop Alexander H. Vinton, of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Western Massachusetts, died at Springfield, Mass., on Wednesday, after a brief illness from pneumonia and bronchitis.

George H. Shaw, former traffic manager of the Canadian Northern railway, with headquarters at Winnipeg, has been appointed to be general traffic manager of all the Canadian Northern lines, with headquarters at Toronto.

Charging her father-in-law, Sir Algernon West with slander for having said that she was responsible for the separation from her husband, Mrs. Horace West, London, got a verdict of \$6,230 damages against Sir Algernon. The latter had accused the plaintiff of being grossly extravagant.

BANK SUPPLIED MONEY

For the Mayoralty Campaign of Dr. Beattie Nesbitt.

Toronto, Jan. 19.—The flight of Dr. Beattie Nesbitt recalls the time about three years ago when he ran for mayor. He resigned the lucrative position of registrar of West Toronto to run. His real object in seeking civic honors is now revealed according to the reports in circulation. He was at the time closely connected with the Farmers' Bank, which was badly in need of money at that time, as recent developments have shown.

The proposition was that with the prestige of the position "mayor of Toronto" would give him, he would go to England and interest English capitalists in the Farmers' Bank and obtain from them liberal assistance for that institution.

This goal was "sufficient inducement for a red-hot campaign and certainly no heat was spared. If any additional steam was necessary it could be easily generated by the other branch of the scheme, which was that Dr. Nesbitt, having succeeded in bolstering up the bank with the British capital, was to receive a salary of \$6,000 a year as president of the bank. The best laid plans, however, "gang aft a-gley," and Nesbitt's failure to get the necessary votes to place Joseph Oliver in the minority corner sent the scheme into the air, though the precise spot where Nesbitt himself fell is not recorded.

Associated with this "better-than-fiction" story is the further interesting rumor that it was the Farmers' Bank that put up the money for the whirlwind campaign, which had Beattie's cohorts chasing "each other up and down the streets and lanes of Toronto in the hunt for votes for their chieftain, who was to revolutionize and put starch into the "dry bones" civic government of Toronto. Possibly heavy withdrawals from the bank about that time may be explained by this charitable work. The scores who have been looted and plundered throughout the land will probably not take much comfort from the thought that some of their hard-earned savings went into a fund which had for its ultimate object the prolongation of the life of an institution, whose plunderers wanted still more booty.

AGED PEOPLE PASS AWAY.

Death of Jeremiah Perry, of North Fredericksburg.

Napanea, Jan. 18.—Yesterday the death occurred of one of the oldest residents in the person of Jeremiah Perry, aged ninety years, at the residence of his son, A. Bowen Perry, North Fredericksburg. He leaves six sons, all well-known residents of the neighborhood. They are Bowen Perry, J. W. Perry, Camden East; Damon Perry, Hay Bay; George W. Perry, Greens; Jeremiah Perry, Anderson's and W. H. Perry, Toronto. The funeral takes place this afternoon.

Mrs. Frank W. Morris passed away on Monday last at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Arnold Wolfe, aged seventy-five years. Deceased had been a resident of Napanea for over forty years, and was much esteemed. She had many warm friends amongst the early residents, and both she and her husband were worthy residents of Napanea. The deceased leaves one adopted daughter, Mrs. Arnold Wolfe, who tenderly cared for her mother in her declining years. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon, and was largely attended.
