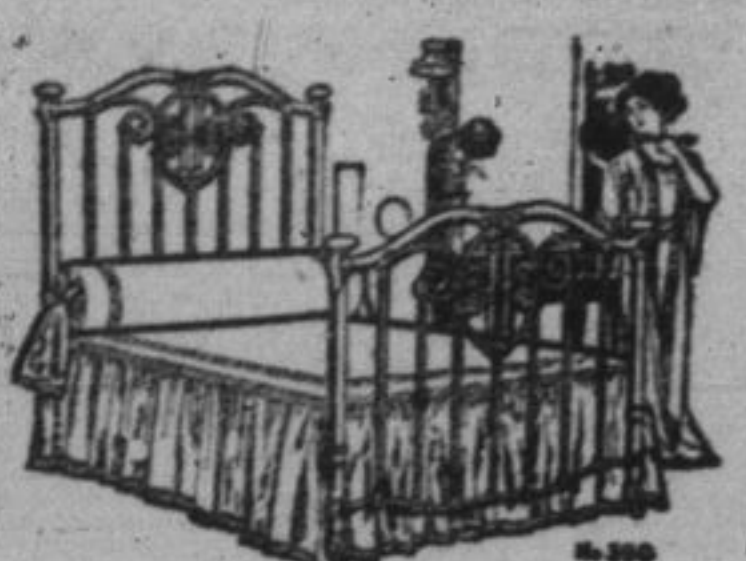

UP TO THE FARMERS

TO ORGANIZE AND SUPPORT ORGANIZATION.
"Organize and Work" Should be Their Motto, Says Writer—Must Invest Money in Freedom's Cause.

West Kensington, London W., Eng., Jan. 9.—(To the Editor): It is certainly gratifying to a Canadian abroad, who is deeply interested in the curtailment of the tariff robbery, to read of the recent efforts of the Canadian farmers to throw from their shoulders the "Old Man of the Sea" protection.

In front of this good work difficulties of enormous proportions present themselves. It is much more difficult to disseminate truths, especially political truths, among people distributed over a wide range of sparsely settled country, than to the same number of people assembled in towns and cities. Macaulay says "that even the most arbitrary of the Caesars found it necessary to divert the inhabitants of Rome at the expense of the country."

For this same reason the inhabitants of Canadian cities have been consistently able to exact tribute from the genuine producers of wealth in the rural districts. The beneficiaries of protection have taken infinite pains, directly and indirectly, to educate the city toilers to the reflected advantages gained by the scientific plunder of the former. The privileged protected classes know that their lease of plunder is dependent upon their dependents in the cities and upon the ignorance and gullibility of the plunderers. They know that the farmer holds the key to the situation, so they act accordingly. They know that they can be assured of the support of townsmen by assuring them that the are joint partners in this economic robbery, so they naturally direct their infernal activities of deception against the farmer.

These protected tyrants know that the present trade movement is pregnant with possibilities of fiscal liberty, and, of course, will do their best to make it abortive. So with Machiavelian ingenuity they have mapped out the Canadian naval scheme.

These interested persons have cleverly disguised the real purpose of the proposed navy which they think will be the ace of trumps when the farmers play the "deuce." They know that to build a navy requires an enormous expenditure of public money. They know that increased expenditure of public money means increased indirect taxation. They know that for every dollar the government collects by indirect taxation they protect manufacturers get six. The navy which nominally costs \$20,000,000 really exacts from the toilers of Canada \$140,000,000. At the present time these patriotic protectionists, whose patriotism not only costs nothing but means huge profits for them, are especially anxious to provide causes for huge increases in the national expenditure, knowing that this expenditure may stifle the farmers' demand for the abolition of protective duties by the plea that the tariff is necessary for revenue purposes. Nothing, therefore, would suit them better than a scheme such as a navy, which would require constant expenditure. By covering their mercenary motives by the old, old trick of the waving of the Union Jack, they have made a clever and strong appeal to the useless and real patriotism of the Canadian farmer. It has been well said that patriotism is the last refuge of a scoundrel.

When all things are considered, the Canadian farmer is not to be blamed for falling into the trap laid by the manufacturers. The war scare, which, as time has shown, was manufactured in England for purely mercenary purposes, and which disturbed the peaceful citizens of this country, naturally had its effect in Canada, and was a Godsend, or rather a devil-send, to the alert and greedy protected vampires who are always on the "qui vive" for plausible reasons for the retention and the increase of protective taxation. As under the guise of patriotism (how much this world has to answer for!) the South African war was generated by garbled and untruthful cablegrams, selfishly inspired by the wealthy Jewish financiers of South Africa, so this war scare in Canada was fanned and kept alive by cablegrams from the English yellow press, which has sinister designs on the freedom and other liberties of the British people. For this reason the arguments of the scaremongers, though absolutely quashed in this country, were in Canada never effectively repudiated. The Canadian people quite naturally thought England to be in grave danger of a German invasion, hence the sudden determination to build a Canadian navy. The original object of this navy was to help England in her hour of need. Its purpose now, the war scare being over, is to help the Canadian manufacturer in his hour of need. It would not be diplomatic on the part of the manufacturers to disclose the real purpose of this naval scheme, so again this word patriotism serves the usual purpose of the scoundrel. Now, a navy is necessary to supply dignity to Canada's national aspirations and patriotism. Greed and hypocrisy go together. Protection is the foster mother of them both.

True to himself, Sir Wilfrid Laurier's actions belie his words. How many times has he assured the Canadian people "that Canada should not be drawn into the vortex of European militarism." His words are true, but with a navy, how can she escape it? "Qui vent le fin vent les moyens." Conversely, it is true that those who profess the means are prepared for the end. A boy with a popgun is not satisfied till he has used it. But what benefit to avoid European militarism if she is plunged into a vortex of militarism of her own making? Canada, with her immense possibilities, has a far nobler career in front of her than to blindly copy the follies of Europe. Canada can become dignified without the mournful achievements of the instruments of death, disaster, disease, and famine. Nations today are no longer elevated, but are debased by military glory. Canada's future greatness will not be determined by battles lost or won. The day of military glory and aggrandisement and ostentation is all but over. The nations of
