**SIGHT NEARLY GONE**

**EXCESSIVE USE OF TOBACCO THE CAUSE.**

A Watertown Employee of Agricultural Insurance Company Has Been Stricken With Nicotine Poisoning After Years of Use of Indian Weed.

Watertown, N.Y., Jan. 20.—Suffering from nicotine poisoning in its most serious form, where the eyesight becomes affected, Milton De Long, of No. 316 Mullin street, a former clerk in the Agricultural Insurance company's office, is home from New York, where he has been attended by four experts.

Mr. De Long's affliction is a rare one in this vicinity. For years he had been an inveterate user of tobacco. During the daytime, when at work over his books, he smoked the weed, very often breaking up cigars to get the full strength. After hours cigars or a pipe were used incessantly, until one day when at work he was suddenly stricken blind. Local physicians diagnosed it as a case of nicotine poisoning.

Mr. De Long is still unable to read, the words on a page running together in a hopeless mass. Glasses avail nothing. Upon the street he wears smoked glasses and is able to get about alone. New York doctors told him that he must attempt no work for six months or more.

At a private New York hospital, Mr. De Long underwent a daily sweating process that, while drawing the nicotine from his saturated body, left him thin and pale. Strychnine was also given to aid in the work of freeing the system from the poison. One operation was performed, at which a bone over the eye and extending down the nose was removed.

Mr. De Long has now lost all craving for tobacco. Since his return here he has gained some weight, tipping the scales better than 105 pounds, but his sight shows little improvement at present. Mr. De Long is a son of Merritt De Long, secretary of the water board, with offices at the city hall.

Returning from a call about midnight, he leaned over the balustrade, at the top of the stairs, to turn out a light, and fell twelve feet to the floor, sustaining a fracture of the spine.

**NO SHOW ON SUNDAY**

**WILL BE PERMITTED IN HULL, QUEBEC.**

The Government Again Threatens the Theatricals — Prosecutions Will This Time be Instituted Under Provincial Statute.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—The Hull moving picture theatre men, who have been congratulating themselves on their recent victory over the provincial authorities with regard to the Sunday closing prosecutions, are due for a rude shock. C. J. Brooke, who acted as crown attorney for the provincial government, states that he has received instructions from the attorney-general's department at Quebec to again take proceedings, the authorities having definitely decided to close all the theatres in the city of Hull on the Sabbath.

The actions will be taken on the Quebec statute referring to this question, and not on the Lord's Day act as on the last occasion.

**MUSIC FOR CONVICTS.**

Worcester, Mass., Jan. 20.—Believing that music will aid in the reformation of law breakers, Keeser Albert T. Richardson, of the House of Correction, will install a music box in the guard room so arranged that all of the inmates may hear it. The men are also to have tobacco, good reading and varied diet.

**A SOCIETY SURPRISE.**

**Heir of Earl Cadogan is Engaged.**

London, Jan. 20.—Another society surprise has been given by the unexpected engagement of Viscount Chelsea to Miss Marie Coxon, a pretty girl of twenty-one, and niece of Lady Jarline. Viscount Chelsea last May passed through the bankruptcy court. He became heir to the earldom of Cadogan and an income of \$500,000 yearly on the recent death of his seventy-year-old nephew. Only a week ago Earl Cadogan, who is seventy years of age, married Countess Palagi at Florence.

**4,000 ACRES IN FLAX.**

**Land Company Preparing to Farm its Holding.**

Calgary, Jan. 20.—C. A. Briggs, who, in company with associates, purchased twenty sections, 13,000 acres, of non-irrigable land, within the irrigation block, south of Kinistone, last summer, announces that he has now organized the Boston-Alberta Development company, and that they propose to put 4,000 acres in flax this spring, breaking the land with tractors. It is the intention of the company to put the greater part of the entire area in wheat as soon as possible.

**Why the Sea is Salt.**

It is generally considered that the saltiness of the sea is accounted for by the deposition of soluble salt from the rivers. Salts of various kinds form part of the constituent ingredients of the earth's soil everywhere; they are washed out by springs and rivulets and carried to the sea by large streams, and as the evaporation which feeds the streams carries none of the dissolved matters back again, the tendency is for the salts to accumulate in the sea. The principle saline ingredients found in ocean water are chloride of sodium; or common salt, with salts of magnesium and lime.

Belleville was well represented at the police station, last night, in the line-up of men who came in for prosecution, there being no less than three who claimed Belleville as their home. Kingston did the right thing and gave their neighbors shelter for the night. The men were on their way to Montreal to look for work. At least this is the story they told.

**CARE OF THE TEETH.**

**Timely Address by Dr. R. E. Sparks at Y.M.C.A.**

The first of the series of health talks arranged by the physical committee of the local Y.M.C.A., was held Thursday evening, in the parlors of the association, before a good-sized and appreciative audience.

Dr. R. E. Sparks was the speaker, and held the interest of his listeners, by his instructive suggestion. He cleverly punctuated his remarks by short witticisms. He divided his subject, "Care of the Teeth," in two parts, namely, Why and How. He clearly showed that the teeth are very important factors in keeping the body in a healthy condition. He reminded the audience that Gladstone chewed each mouthful of food thirty-two times, which accounted for his long life. He also impressed the importance of thoroughly cleaning the teeth each morning, using a powder or paste, and after each meal with clear water.
