For Presbyterian Schemes.
Toronto, Jan. 20.—The total receipts of the Presbyterian church in Canada for 1910 for church schemes were \$203,702, as against \$181,577 in 1909. CARNEGIE HEROES.

Medal for New York Street Commissioner.

Pittsburg, Jan. 20.—Twenty-six awards in recognition of acts of heroism were made by the Carnegie hero fund commission, sixteen bronze and ten silver medals, besides cash awards were made in rescues or attempted rescues from drowning, three from fire, two from suffocation in wells, and one each from trains and shooting. In nine instances the heroes lost their lives, and the award is made to a member of the family.

One of the recipients of a silver medal is New York's street cleaning commissioner, William H. Edwards, who figured in the incidents in connection with the shooting of William J. Gaynor on the deck of the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse on August 9th last.

G.T.P. After Hudson Bay Line.

Ottawa, Jan. 19.—A telegram was received, to-day, by Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways, from Charles M. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway company, containing an offer from the Grand Trunk Pacific, to negotiate operation of the Hudson Bay railway. While no terms were mentioned, it is surmised that the Grand Trunk Pacific would desire a lease similar to the one under which it will operate the eastern section of the National Transcontinental. A substantially similar offer, it is said, had already been received from the Canadian Northern, and it is hoped that better terms may be secured from one or the other of the competing companies. The present proposition contemplates the construction of a line by the Grand Trunk Pacific from Saskatoon to the Pas Mission. This proposition follows up on a conference held here last evening, in which President Hays, Mr. Wainwright and Chief Engineer Kalliber participated.
