ARE MANICURE PARLORS IN CITY OF WASHINGTON.

Police Seck Manager - White Slavers Took Revenge on New

Washington, D.C., Jan. 21.-A profitable white slave traffic that has its inception within the very shadows of the National capital, and extended to wenty-four cities over the country, has been revealed by raids conducted here on manicuring and massage parlors. Six young women are being held in the city juil to-day, while active search is being made for the UUY man who has conducted the system and has enriched himself by the illicit-

Innocent girls of tender years have lice allege, by newspaper advertisements calling for "manicurists," and by promises of munificent pecuniary reward after a preparatory course imited to two or three days. The girls engaged were then shifted from city to city, as long as there was an advantage in retaining them. Eventually they are cut adrift to shift for

This new system received its first exposure in Pittsburg last month. when "Doctor" Otto Higenbech and several of his girls, including an "instructress," were arrested and fined.

Duca, whose sisters, Mary, eleven, and Josie, nine, testified against a gang of white slave traffickers last summer, sending five to prison, is nysteriously missing from her home in Brooklyn. The girl's parents told the police that Annie had been kid napped and perhaps killed, for re venge by other members of the band or by the friends.

The girl has been missing for two weeks but the parents were in such terror of the friends of the convicted white slavers that they feared to notify the police before to-day.
