QUEEN'S DEFEATED THE CRACK PARKDALE TEAM

In an Exhibition Game by 8 to 5—Queen's H. and Royal Military College Tied, 8 to 8, in an Intermediate Intercollegiate Game.

The supporters of Queen's senior and intermediate hockey teams received a pleasant surprise at the covered rink, Saturday night, to see both teams do so well in their contests. Although the first was only an intermediate Intercollegiate game, and the second an exhibition one, the rink was well filled with spectators. Queen's I defeated Parkdale by 8 to 5, and Queen's II and Royal Military College I tied, 8 to 8.

The first game was the intermediate intercollegiate contest. For the first half the game was very slow and the ice in poor shape. R.M.C. had the better of the play, and it looked an easy win for the cadets. Carruthers, the speedy centre man of the latter, scored in three minutes after the game had started, on a nice shot from the side, while Smith, R.M.C., followed suit one minute afterwards on a short shot from centre. Anglin scored Queen's first goal after a minute afterwards, on an individual rush. Carruthers and Anglin worked a two-man combination, which resulted in another goal for the R.M.C. Slater, the wing man of the cadets, made his initial goal, which was regarded as a fluke. Boyd stopped it with his skate, and then lost sight of it, during which time it was poked in. Elliott, of Queen's, and Slater and Wright, of R.M.C., were side-tracked to the bench for illegal work. In the next rush, Smith, of Cadets, scored on a nice rush from the centre to the left side, where he shot with scoring effect. This finished the scoring in the first half for the Cadets. Queen's obtained one more goal, which was made by Blakesley. Here a long delay resulted from one of the cadets getting a nasty swipe over the fingers. In the latter part of the first half, Lewis, Queen's wing man, has his leg hurt, and R.M.C. put off a man to open up. At the end of half time the score stood 5 to 2 for R.M.C.

Things were looking pretty blue for the Queen's boys and their supporters were not saying much, while the cadets were cheering wildly. The second half started off with Smith tacking another score to Cadets' score list. Here things took a change. The students realized that if they were to win, something must be done, and that right away. The opening came when McKay Meikle got the chance to get in a dead end shot close to Cadets' nets. This gave Queen's the stimulus they needed, and from this time to the end of the game, the play was anything but slow. Brilliant individual rushes, hard body-checking and nice combination work at times went to make the game interesting to the spectators' standpoint. The contest was punctuated with a great many penalties, in which Elliott figured conspicuously. Slater, of R.M.C., was the next to score, making it 7 to 3 for Cadets. Macdonnell, who came on in the second half in Smith's place, made a pretty dash down the side over to centre, and scored. Blakesley, after the next scratch-off, tallied another one for Queen's. Carruthers scored the last goal which Cadets obtained. Blakesley made a beautiful dash down the centre of the ice, and scored on a long shot. A Meikle nibbled another shot from the left side, while Elliott made a swift rush down the centre of the ice, just a few minutes before time was called, and ended up, the score standing 8 to 5.

There is no doubt that the R.M.C. played a better brand of hockey than did Queen's, and it seemed one by good luck that anything else that the student came out so well. Blakesley was the star for Queen's, although Meikle brothers played a heady game. Elliott, at point, was conspicuous by his size and used his body to good advantage in checking. Smith, Carruthers and Slater were the pick of Cadets and played a dashing game. Macdonnell, in goal, did good work, and stopped numberless shots from Queen's men.

The second game was even more of a surprise to the supporters than the first, partly on account of the fact that so much had been heard about Parkdale as being the likely senior O.H.A. champions for this season, and partly on account of the fact that Dobson, the man on whom the fans rely, to bring Queen's team through to victory, was not on the line-up. Neither was Cover-Point Trimble, and yet Queen's trounced the Toronto crack seven.

Owing to the fact that the atmosphere had become colder, the ice was in better condition for the second game than it was for the first, and this was a valuable asset to Queen's, as they do not show up well on soft ice. The first half, which was played under intercollegiate rules, did not seem to help Queen's any, for at half time the score stood 2 to 1 in favor of Parkdale. Queen's did better work in the second half, working under O.H.A. rules. Davidson, of Parkdale, hit the trail for the first goal, when, on a scratch-off in front of Queen's goal, he poked it in without any trouble. Grey, of Queen's, started Queen's scoring a few minutes later, by a rush from the left side near the centre. The only other scoring in the first half was a goal by Davidson, who drew Queen's defence out, and on a lone rush the whole length of the ice, shot and scored. Things remained quiet for the remainder of the first half, both teams striving with all their might to break through the defence of their opponents and trying to score, but it was of no use.

It was in the second half that Box, the little 115-pounder of Queen's, distinguished himself in a remarkable manner. Greg George opened up the

scoring on a short shot near goal. Box scored a minute later, on a pass from the side. Box scored again on a pass from Lockett. Smith, the wing man, was the next to find the nets for Queen's, on a pass from the centre. Box and Basil George worked their combination, and Box scored on a pass from Basil. The next one to tally was Ridpath, Parkdale's right wing, on a pass from the left side. Box and McKinnon worked the combination again and McKinnon shot. Hunter, the right wing of Parkdale, scored the last two goals which the Toronto bunch received, while Basil George tallied for Queen's on a rush the entire length of the ice.

Box, Queen's centre, played the game of the evening, being directly responsible for four of the eight goals which Queen's scored. His playing was spectacular all the way through. George brothers played a great game, as also did Gilbert, in goal. "Vic" Gilbert stopped a good many seemingly impossible shots. Lockett, who was playing in Trimble's place, got through Parkdale's defence repeatedly, in a manner which won praise from spectators. Smith, a new man, was tried out at right wing, and proved to be very good. Davidson, Hunter and Ridpath were the stars of the Parkdale team, and played a wonderful game. Hunter is a whirlwind and a tricky player. Holmes played a good game in goal and was right on the job all the time.

During one period in the second half there were only three Parkdale men on the ice, the others having been retired for rough tactics. Queen's played a much cleaner game than the westerners.
