DIED AT GLENBURNIE.

Robert Reid Passed Away on Wednesday.

Robert Reid, one of the land marks of Glenburnie, passed away, at his home, Wednesday morning, after a very brief illness. He contracted bronchitis a short time ago and grew worse. Tuesday afternoon the fever was expressed that he would not last through the night.

The late Robert Reid was born in Glenburnie, eighty-two years ago, and had lived there all his life. He had enjoyed good health and when the disease overtook him he was not prepared for it and he did not last long. Besides his wife he leaves one son, William, deputy reeve of the township of Kingston; two brothers, John, of Kepler, and David, of Elgin, Ill., and two sisters, Mrs. H. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in any of the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion office of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions.

Under six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live on the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to carry homestead entry) and cultivate fifty acres there.

In certain districts a homesteader in section already has homesteaded. Price, \$1.50 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to carry homestead entry) and cultivate fifty acres there.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$1.50 per acre. Duties—Must reside six
