COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE DEFEATED R.M.C. JUNIORS

In Intercollegiate Match by 6 to 4—McGill Won the Game with Queen's in Montreal by 6 to 4.

At the covered rink, last night, Collegiate Institute defeated R.M.C. H. in the junior intercollegiate hockey series, by a score of 6 to 4. Only a small crowd turned out to see the match, which was quite a snappy one from start to finish. At half time, the score stood 3 to 1 in favor of the collegians. "Senator" Powell was the referee. A Montreal despatch says—McGill hockey outfit sprang a surprise on Queen's aggregation in the opening game of the senior intercollegiate series here, on Friday evening, trimming the presbyterians by the score of seven to four. Following on their recent defeat in Toronto at the hands of "Varsity," McGill were picked by many to crumple up before the champions line-up. The first half resulted in an even break. George opened for Queen's, but Sargent came back within ten minutes and tied the score. George again put the presbyterians to the good, and Scott evned up before half time, for McGill.

For the first twenty minutes of the second half, the McGill forwards had their opponents played to a standstill. Constant checking back left the McGill defence comparatively little to do. Scott and Sargent again figured largely in the scoring the latter putting in three goals while the former scored one. Towards the end of the period George and Box netted for Queen's, but the game terminated with another score for the red and white through Davidson. The rink was crowded to capacity with supporters of the students.

Queen's were without Trimble at cover-point and Dobson on the wing, and thus were not the same team as defeated "Varsity" or Parkdale.
