CARSON'S SCHEME

FOR THE ROAD BUILDING IN THE CITY.

Has Material Which Has Stood Test and Which Has Been Approved by Authority—Now Awaiting the Cost—Can be Put Down by Local Men—Material Manufactured in Venezuela.

Ald. Carson is out with a new scheme for road making, which, if adopted, he claims will do away with mud roads in Kingston, forever. This is the scheme the alderman referred to at the last meeting of the board of works. He has all the information at hand, with the exception of the price for the same, but he hopes to have this ready to place before the members of the committee at the next meeting.

Ald. Carson says that last year he had a committee which reported him in his suggestions, but he thinks that the board this year is composed of men who will give every attention to his scheme, and that the city will benefit by it.

"If this scheme is adopted," said Ald. Carson, "I am sure that it will be good-bye to mud roads in Kingston."

The alderman made the statement at the last meeting of the board of works, that he had a scheme for building roadways, as a Whig representative asked him for the particulars.

The material to be used in the making of the roadway is known as "Bermudez Road Asphalt," and is manufactured at Venezuela, imported and handled by the Barter Asphalt Company, of Philadelphia, Pa.

Ald. Carson has secured all the information he could on the question, and has found that it has been used in many places in the United States and in England, and that it has given splendid results. He has the statements of an authority praising the material. The authority in question is Francis Wood, C.E., F.G.S., engineer and surveyor, Borough, of Fulham, S.W. introduced. He gives the benefit of the test he made of the roadway, and also points out that it formerly cost four thousand pounds per year, to maintain the macadam roads, but that this new system will reduce it to 700 pounds in a very few years.

An explanation of the system is best given in a statement by Engineer Wood. He states that in the test made on the roadway, over two thousand vehicles passed over it, one thousand cars and motor buses, and even traction engines, of heavy weight, which could not make an impression on it.
