





Glenvale Cheese Factory. A statement has just been given of year 1910, which shows total receipts \$15,303.30. The amount paid the patrons was \$13,709.79; last year, \$12, 745.90. The amount received for cheese last year was \$15,265.48; for 1909, \$14,139.92. The amount of milk used was 15,323.21 pounds; in 1909, 13,442.47 pounds. The average price per pound last year was 10.79c.; 1909, 11.455c. per pound. Average number of pounds required to make milk last year, 10.88; in 1909, 10.83.
