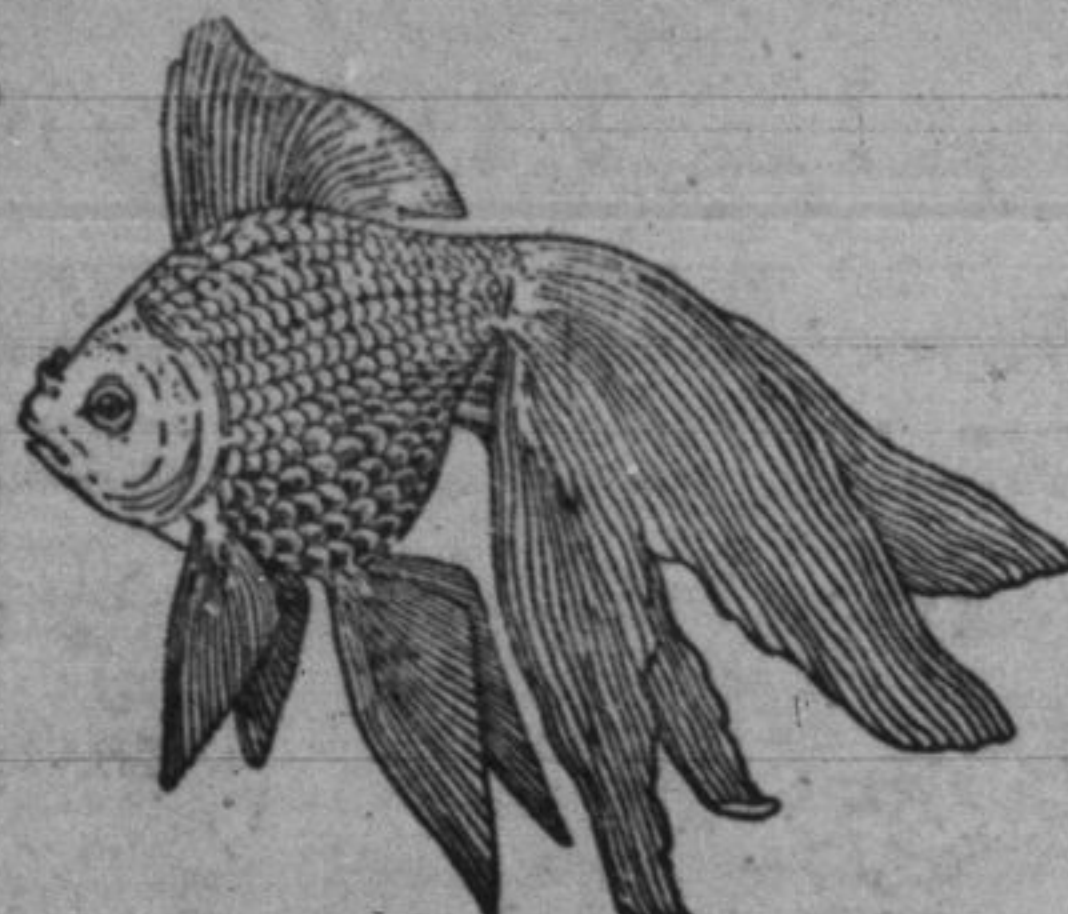

FEAR IS EXPRESSED 20TH ANNIVERSARY

OF UNION OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES.

That Welland Project Will Be Sacrificed

For the Georgian Bay Canal—Mayor Geary, of Toronto, writes the Kingston Council to Bestir Itself in the Matter.

Mayor Geary, of Toronto, fears that strong pressure is not brought to bear upon the Canadian government, the Welland canal enlargement project will be allowed to drop, and the Georgian Bay route take precedence. The Toronto mayor wrote the city council regarding the matter, and his letter was read at last evening's meeting. He said:

"Judging from newspaper reports, I fear that unless the municipalities bestir themselves, and appeal to the premier and their local member at once, all the good work done in this province will be lost, and the interests of the Welland canal sacrificed for the sake of the Georgian Bay canal. It is stated that three millions will be out in the estimates for this canal, with no mention of the Welland, 'leave give the matter your early attention.'"

On motion of Ald. Rigney, seconded by Ald. Kent, this resolution was adopted: That the municipal council of the city of Kingston desires to place itself on record as being opposed to any movement having for its object the construction of the Georgian Bay canal before adequate provision is made for the deepening of the Welland canal, and the St. Lawrence river route, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the premier of the dominion and the member for the city of Kingston.

LOOKING FOR FARM HELP.

Local Agent Has Already Received Requests.

James F. Knapp, local immigration agent, who also secures men for work on farms, has already received a number of requests for farm laborers. He says that all the farmers who will be seeking help would do well to send in their request to him as early as possible so that he will have time to look after the matter. A great many out of the matter until the last minute, as it were, and then the men cannot be secured.

Mr. Knapp says that the class of men secured for farm work, last year, was the best in many years, and that he farmers were well pleased. Nearly every man, placed with a farmer last season, was a good worker. This is certainly a good record.

A farmer near Kingston secured a man from Mr. Knapp, and a short time after the man went out on the farm to work. Mr. Knapp was very much surprised to receive a call from the farmer who lives close beside the farmer referred to.

"I want to get a man like you sent to Mr. —," he said. He's a first-class worker, and I am in need of a good man."

Mr. Knapp said that he would do his best. He sent out a man whom he thought would be suitable, and he was glad to learn afterwards that the man had turned out O.K., and that the farmer was well pleased.

Addresses were given by Prof. McClement, of Queen's university, and John Steele, a recitation by Miss Agnes Monks and solo by Miss Maggie Lesage and Miss McIntosh.

Celebrated in Brock Street Methodist Church Monday Evening—Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald Spoke.

The quarterly rally of the Young People's Societies of Kingston was held, Monday evening, in Brock Street Methodist church, a record crowd gathered, filling a "body" of the church. The devotional exercises were conducted by H. W. Newman, president of the league, and Rev. F. H. Sparrow. Mr. Newman said, in his opening remarks, that the union was celebrating its twentieth anniversary. Twenty years ago, the union had been formed, and he believed that it was stronger than ever. With such a gathering of young people, their influence was bound to be felt. The officers of 1910 had endeavored to perform their duty in every respect. He felt that although they had endeavored to do good work, there might have been more progress made. There is a mighty work to be done among the young people of this city. Some people have said that Young People's Societies in the city had had their day, but he believed that there was even more to be done now than ever. There are hundreds of young people wandering about the streets every evening who could be reached by these societies. We must not waste time; we must get busy right away and try and bring them into the circle of better environment. He spoke of the provincial convention which is to be held in Toronto on February 15th, and urged all the societies to send at least one representative, if not more. There is a great deal to be learned at Toronto that will be of interest to societies. Kingston wants a convention here in 1912, and if the local societies go strong enough to Toronto, they can bring it here next year. The president then called for reports from the different officers of the league, with reference to the work that had been done in the past year.

R. Gage, secretary, in his report, said there had been marked advancement in the league during the past year, which showed that the enthusiasm had not abated one whit. The influence from the societies had pervaded sections of the city and outside places. There are seven societies in the league, each in a flourishing condition, and all making marked progress. The executive of the league had met five times for business during the past year, and two rallies had been held, one in May, in Bethel church, and the other in November, at Sydenham Street Methodist church, which took the form of a banquet.

Miss M. Adsett, junior organizer, gave a very encouraging report of the year's work, which showed all societies to be in good shape. The treasurer, Charles Anglin, presented an account which showed the total receipts for the year to be \$47.89, while the expenditure was \$36.13, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$11.76.

The roll call of the seven societies was given, after which Mr. Newman introduced Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald. Mr. Fitzgerald said he was pleased to have been asked to be present and address the gathering. He said in listening to one of the reports he had heard, mentioned was made to missions and resolved that he would speak on that subject. He felt that anyone who had been called to follow Christ was a missionary, that he had been saved to save others. The first and earliest body of men, Christ's disciples, were missionaries and endeavored by every means in their power to bring their brothers and sisters to a saving knowledge of the truth. One way to become a missionary is to use one's personality. Personality is a great thing, and everyone is possessed of a great deal of it. If it is used in the right way it may count for a great deal. A strong, sane mind, a strong disposition and an indomitable will are the great things in every day life. The future of mankind, he said, depended on the personalities of the best young people. If they are to be strong and able to do the right thing, they must be pure in heart to accomplish their task. He was glad to see so many young men and boys present. It augured well for the societies, which they represented. Most boys, he said, were fond of athletics and he urged them to take an active part in clean manly sports. It would benefit them spiritually as well as physically. The young ladies he advised to keep themselves pure and to choose good companions. This meant a great deal to their morals. He spoke of the way Canada is spoken of in the old country as the land of magnificent forests, mines, prairies and crop-producing soil. Canadians were urged to feel proud of their land and he did not think, although it seemed to some that Canadians were taking credit on themselves for making "F" this, when in reality it was a God-given gift, and we should remember this. While we have all these things, we must not forget that the most valuable asset of this country is the young people and he was glad to see that the young people's societies of Kingston had realized this, and were endeavoring to cope with the problem.

The officers for the years were elected by acclamation as follows: Honorary presidents, T. F. Harrison and Dr. E. J. Lake; president, Robert Tremer; vice-president, H. W. Newman; secretary, R. Gage; assistant secretary, Miss M. Adsett; corresponding secretary, Miss Edith Orser; treasurer, H. P. Pickering; organizer, Samuel Lilly; superintendents of junior and intermediate work, Misses Peters and Anglin.

The results of the roll call were then read which showed that Bethel had a lead over Princess street by a fraction of a per cent., and the president decided to call it a tie, and awarded the banner to the two societies each to have it for a month and a half. The banner was presented to Bethel by Rev. A. P. Benson and received by Frederick Wilson. The officers were then installed by Rev. E. LeRoy Rice. During the evening Miss Edith Orser sang very sweetly.

THE CITY COUNCIL

DECIDES TO ABOLISH THE PRINTING COMMITTEE

And Let Each Department Look After Its Own Printing—Garbage Deputation Authorized to Visit Western Cities.

The city council had an hour's session last evening, transacting principally routine business. In attendance were Mayor Graham and Aids, Armstrong, Bailey, Carson, Couper, Clugston, Elliott, Fraser, Givens, Hanley, Harrison, Harty, Hoag, Kent, McCann, McCarthy, Rigney, Ross, Shaw and Toye.

These communications were received: James Adams and others protesting against a permanent pavement on Brock street, between Wellington and King streets.

Premier of Ontario acknowledging receipt of resolution of council re municipal elections.

H. Phillips, superintendent of parks, asking increase of salary.

Edward McFadden and others asking for the construction of a walk in Frontenac park.

The Union of Canadian Municipalities regarding a bill to amend the Railway Act.

W. J. B. Turner, Salvation Army, asking a grant in aid of work.

The Union of Canadian Municipalities asking this municipality to subscribe.

W. M. Lochead, secretary Berlin Board of Trade enclosing resolution re operating trains from union stations.

The Financial Post of Canada, asking for advertising.

The National Sanitarium Association, asking for aid for free hospital for consumptives.

City auditor asking that all departments issue orders in duplicate or triplicate.

T. E. Monierie and others, asking for an arc light, on Durham street.

City Auditor Muir reported that he was unable to sanction the payment of wages to civic employees, weekly without amending the by-law or resolution of council. The city solicitor will be asked to draft the necessary resolution.

Reports of Committees.

The Board of Works recommended that upon a title satisfactory to the city solicitor being made out, and a proper deed of conveyance being executed, the mayor and city treasurer be authorized to issue cheques for the following amounts to the under-named owners of the several parcels of land required for the extension of Barrie street from Quebec street to Pine street—Wilhelmina Ryder, Pt. Lot 1, \$175; W. C. T. Jenkins, Pt. Lot 4, \$1,000; S. V. McCaig, Pt. Lot 1, \$1,500; John Woods, Pt. Lot 15, \$250; Jane A. Grant, Pt. Lot 1, \$50.

The tender prices are lower than those of last year. Cement, for instance, is \$1.59 a barrel, ten cents lower than a year ago.

The recommendations of the board were adopted.

The Fire and Light committee, recommended that the chairman and Ald. Hoag be authorized to engage W. Yellowless to test the Chatham engine. Adopted.

Ald. Elliott asked why the fire and light committee reported no action upon the application of W. J. Morgan for the position of the veterinary surgeon of the fire department.

Ald. Givens said that the present incumbent, Dr. Nichols, was giving satisfaction.

Ald. Elliott contended that the veterinary was not appointed by by-law. He understood the position was a yearly one. Some years ago, an appointment was made in May.

Ald. Givens and Hoag agreed with Ald. Elliott that it would be best to make the appointment properly.

Ald. Elliott said that the matter should go back to the committee, which should make a recommendation. This suggestion was adopted and the clause in the committee's report was withdrawn.

The garbage committee recommended that a sub-committee, consisting of the chairman, Ald. Toye, Ald. Bailey and the medical health officer be appointed to go to Brantford, Guelph and other places if necessary to investigate their garbage systems, with a view of obtaining information for the benefit of the committee in installing a system in this city, and that the finance committee be instructed to furnish necessary funds.

Ald. Toye said that the medical health officer was unable to go, and he asked that the city engineer take his place on the committee.

Ald. Givens did not think it was necessary to seal away a deputation. He thought that sufficient information might be secured by correspondence. If it could not, then a deputation could be sent away.

Ald. Hoag and Elliott strongly favored a deputation as the most satisfactory way to secure the information Kingston requires to establish a garbage system.

Ald. Shaw pointed out that the time was short before the spring, and the information could be secured quickly by a deputation.

The council decided to adopt the recommendation of the committee, substituting the name of the city engineer for that of the medical health officer.

By-laws Read. A by-law was presented, on recommendation of the finance committee, to abolish the printing committee and place the civic printing under the various departments. Each committee would deal with its own printing.

Ald. Ross thought a further reduction of committees could be made. For instance, property and parks could be amalgamated.

Ald. Rigney thought that the fire and light and the waterworks committees could be amalgamated. Formerly there was only one committee for these two departments—Fire, water and light.

Ald. Kent said that a committee might be appointed to consider such amalgamations. He thought that some of the duties of the board of works could be transferred to the parks committee, which should, for instance, have charge of the trees and boulevards of the city.

Ald. Elliott said that as the various committees have been formed and begun their duties for the year it would be unwise to make any change now outside of abolishing the printing committee. The by-law was passed, and hereafter, each committee will attend to its own printing.

A by-law was given its second reading for the changing of Waste's Lane to Elgin street.

Ald. Ross thought it would have been a fitting thing for this thoroughfare to have been named Graham street.

The city clerk stated that the committee some time ago decided upon the name of the street, residents having petitioned.

The third reading of the by-law will take place when the judge of the court attends to the change.

The council adjourned at 9:15 o'clock in time to see the fire brigade in action on King street, in sight of the council chamber.
