DOES DUKE SUCCEED TO AN EMPTY THRONE? ASKS LONDON MAIL.
British Press Comments on Connaught's Coming to Canada—He Smelt Powder at Thine of Fenian Troubles.
London, Jan. 30.—The Daily Graphic says: "In the Duke of Connaught we find our best in a double sense, and we recall the fact that forty-one years ago he smelt powder in the Fenian troubles in Canada. Referring to the trade agreement, we may safely assume that the mutual affection between us is undiminished by the commercial arrangement, adding prosperity to the dominion."
The Morning Post says the Duke of Connaught's appointment marks the final stage in the entrance of the eldest and largest dominion nation to equal status with the inhabitants of the United Kingdom. Constitutionally

The Duchess of Connaught and her most attractive daughter, the Princess Patricia, who accompanied the Duke of Connaught to South Africa, where he opened the first South African parliament, quite won all hearts by their graciousness. The Duchess is a German princess, only daughter of Prince Frederick of Prussia, and among the royal family is known as being intensely shy.
Her royal highness is very fond of golf, being a most expert player, as she is a splendid putter and her approaches are also magnificent. While possessing many fine jewels, her superb pair of diamond solitaire earrings always attract much attention.
The scheme of imperial preference with Canada as the corner-stone is dead, it says, but the idea of federation is not. The Duke of Connaught can do much to strengthen Canadian sentiment towards the empire.

THE DUKE OF CONNAUGHT.
Sketch of Canada's Royal Governor-General.
Arthur William Patrick Albert, Duke of Connaught, was born on May 1st, 1850. He had the usual careful "bringing up and training" of a member of the royal family. Entering the army he served in Canada during the Fenian raid, and some years later served with the Egyptian expeditionary force, being present at the battle of Mahuda and the capture of Tel-el-Kebir. Among his more important military commands subsequently were those of commander of the Bombay forces, commander of the forces in Ireland, inspector-general of the forces and president of the Selection force, and commander-in-chief of the Mediterranean. The latter command he resigned two years ago. Quite recently he represented the king at the opening of the first parliament of the union of South Africa. The Duchess of Connaught and Princess Patricia accompanied him.
During the training of the Queen's Own Rifles, in the British manoeuvres in September, the duke visited the Canadian regiment's camp at Avington park, near the village of Iteben Abbas. He inspected the regiment, and delivered a soldierly address to the officers and men.
The coming of the Duke of Connaught will be of special interest to the Masonic order of Canada. His royal highness, who is the grand master of the grand lodge of England, is an honorary member of Zealand Masonic lodge, Toronto. The duke's visit to Zealand lodge some years ago was a historical event in Toronto masonry.



PRINCESS PATRICIA.
Princess Patricia, who is the most popular of all the English princesses, is tall and slender; fair, with grey eyes, and a perfect delicacy of coloring.
Noted for a gay spirit, a brightness and quickness of speech, seldom to be found among royal ladies, she always dresses in a smart style, and her frocks invariably arouse admiring comment.
This princess is a fine linguist, a fine musician and a clever artist. Her paintings of flowers have been sent on occasions to the new gallery.
Outdoor life and amusements claim much of her attention, as she rides well and plays golf and hockey.
A rather curious peculiarity is said to be possessed by her royal highness. This is known as the odde force—a power which tells its owner when he or she is in the neighborhood of water or of metal.
Princess Pat, as Princess Patricia of Connaught is lovingly called by the English people, was born on St. Patrick's Day, hence the Patricia, which is preceded by Victoria, which shows she is a god-child of the late Queen Victoria, and Helena indicates that Princess Christian was another sponsor.

BISHOP IN TROUBLE
OVER INTERFERENCE CONCERNING MARRIAGE LICENSES.
He is Threatened With Proceedings by the Chancellor of His Own Diocese—Bishop's Action is Illegal.
London, Jan. 31.—The Bishop of London's interference in the issuing of licenses for the marriage of divorced persons and for marrying with a deceased wife's sister has got him in trouble. He is threatened with proceedings by the chancellor of his own diocese. The bishop a week ago put forward a claim in regard to the licenses of this description, forbidding the chancellor to issue them without the bishop's written permission in each case. The chancellor maintains that this is illegal. He has told the bishop that unless he withdraws his claim, he will move for a prohibition against it in the court of king's bench. What ever may be the outcome of this particular incident it is evident that the question of marriages between divorced persons and marriages of a deceased wife's sister may lead to a quarrel between the established church and the civil power. No clergyman is compelled to perform those marriages if he objects, but neither a bishop nor the clergy can be permitted to hinder them.
STOP MISUSE OF RED CROSS.
To Take Steps to Prevent Use of Emblem by Advertisers.
Washington, Jan. 31.—The American Red Cross has asked the solicitor-general of the United States to advise it as to the proper steps for the enforcement of that portion of its federal charter relating to the use of its emblem and name for advertising by private firms and manufacturers. Such use of the Red Cross emblem is punishable by a penalty up to \$500, or a year's imprisonment. It is believed that many persons who use the emblem and name for advertising purposes are not aware of the fact that such use is forbidden by law.
The United States has entered into a treaty with all the civilized governments of the world to prevent the misuse of the Red Cross emblem or title. The law adopted by the United States specifically prohibited the use of a "Greek Red Cross" on a white ground, or any sign or insignia made, or colored, in imitation thereof, or of the words "Red Cross" or "Geneva Cross" or any combination of these words. This use is forbidden even for charitable purposes, except by the American Red Cross, its employees and agents and the army and navy sanitary and hospital authorities.

TO STOP EMIGRATION.
Spain Proposes to Begin Large Public Works.
Madrid, Jan. 31.—Spain is alarmed over the extent of emigration. It is estimated that nearly 200,000 persons leave this country annually for new homes in North and South America. It is proposed to begin large public works in order to give employment to those who might otherwise seek work in foreign places. The plans include irrigation, the construction of 20,000 miles of highways and branch railroads and the colonization of sections of Aragon and Catalonia, now neglected because inadequately watered.
Drift of Public Opinion.
Wall Street Journal.
"When the commodities at present imported or likely to be imported from Canada under a reciprocity treaty are measured with the like commodities produced in our own country, it will be seen how comparatively trivial the import trade is and how it is destined to affect the interests of any considerable class of persons, except in the profitable direction of increasing our commerce and enlarging our markets. Take wheat for example. We produce 690,000,000 bushels a year. Canada has perhaps an exportable surplus of 40,000,000 or 50,000,000 bushels, most of which will go as ocean freight to Europe. Suppose it all came here, what of it? Of what importance is six per cent. or seven per cent. added to our wheat crop? Not as much as its annual variation without any imports at all.
"On the other hand, in case of a short crop at home, it is comforting to know that we have the means of supplying the deficiency within a few days' call, and in the hands of friendly neighbors, from whom no maritime war with distant powers could separate us, and whose markets would always cheerfully respond to our commercial demands. We await the details of the proposed treaty with interest."

Issue Must be Squarely Met.

The reciprocal trade agreement drafted by representatives of the United States and representatives of the Dominion government must be accepted or rejected as it stands. It is not open to amendment by articles or by schedule. It cannot be revised "piecemeal" or otherwise. Those who want free lumber and protected (?) wheat must strike a balance between their desires, as must those who want protected lumber and free wheat. Those in whose hands the fate of the proposed agreement now rest must weigh local interests against national interests. There is little or no opening for long-rolling or for vote-trading. The issue presented must be squarely met.
Her Twenty Years Old.
Ogdensburg, N.Y., Jan. 31.—The annual exhibition of the St. Lawrence Poultry Association opened at the State Armory here, this morning, and the entry is such as to assure the biggest show of the kind ever held in Northern New York. One attraction will be a hen that has attained the age of twenty years.
Twenty thousand dollars, covered by insurance, was the extent of the damage done by the early morning fire at Truro, N.S., which destroyed the largest drug store in that part of the province. The buildings were completely destroyed, cause unknown.
