CAB HORSES KILLED DASHED INTO G.T.R. FREIGHT TRAIN AT CATARAQUI. The Animals Were Cut to Pieces—They Were Owned by James Eves—Ran Away While Driver Was in Cafe. A fine team and hack belonging to James Eves, the well-known bar-tender, were killed early this morning, as the result of a runaway, in which the outfit was demolished by being run into by a G.T.R. freight train at Cataract crossing. Mr. Eves had brought Dr. Robert Hanley and a student, who was hurt in the hockey match last night to King's Cafe, where they went inside to get something to eat. Mr. Eves tied his team to the telegraph pole and went inside to collect his fare. He had just got inside, when the horses started. They dashed up Princess street and on out the York Road to Cataract. As they were going over the crossing they were struck by a freight train which came along a short time after, further mutilated the animals and when a party of young people came along on their way into town, the one horse was found cut to pieces and the other one was terribly mangled. The cab, a shapless mass, was thrown into the corner of the fence, and was so badly smashed that those who were there could not tell whom it belonged to. A medicine case, belonging to Dr. Hanley, was in the cab, and everything in it was scattered over the track. The horses started from the city about 2:30 o'clock, and as they tore up the street, startled citizens out of their slumbers. Mr. Eves said his horses were very quiet, and he did not know how they became frightened at all. The outfit was a total loss. The horses were valued at about \$300, and the cab which was of the latest approval pattern, was worth about \$100, so the total loss is a heavy one.
