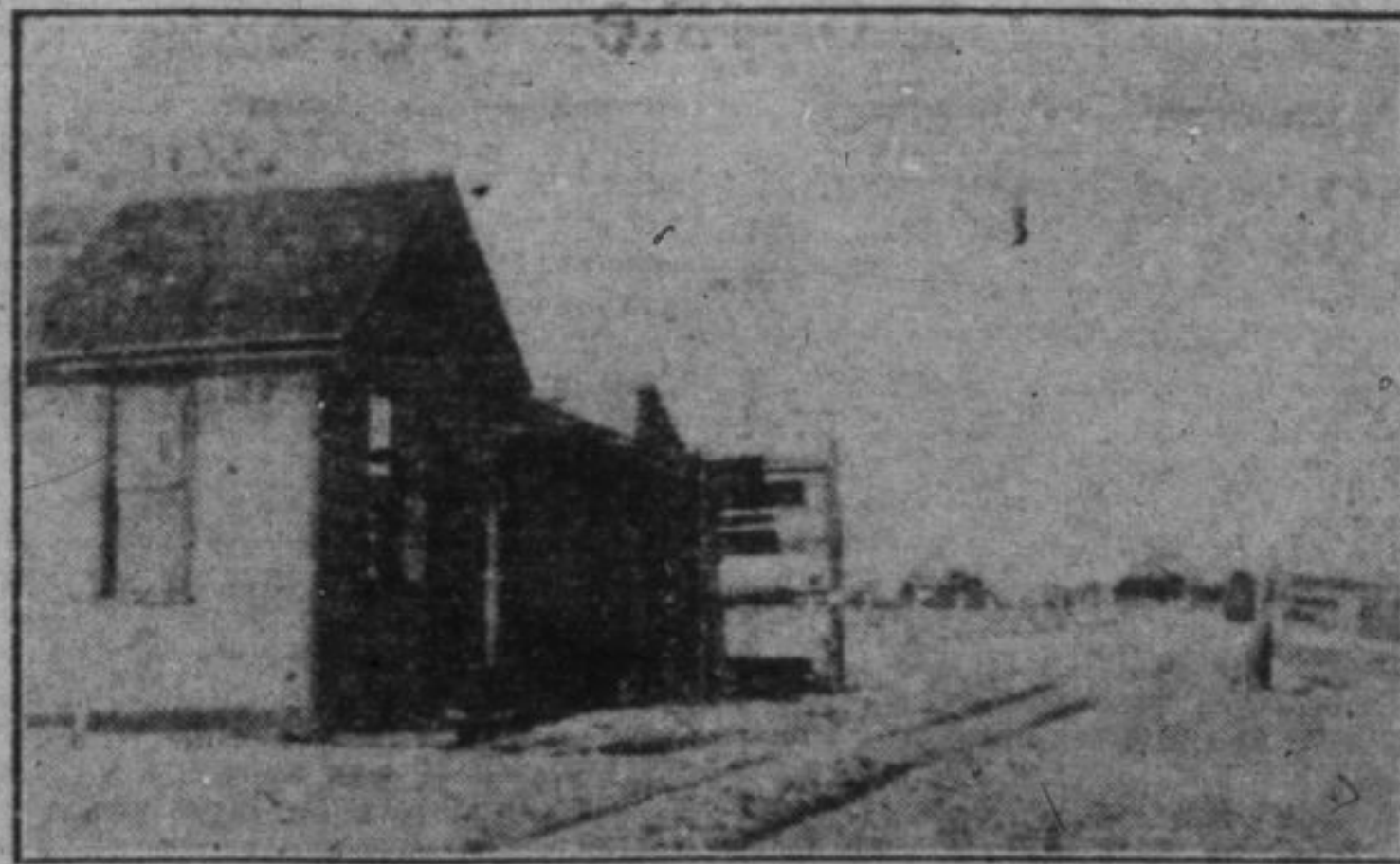


LAST OF FRONTENAC'S TOLL GATES



The above is a picture of the toll house and gate on the Kingston-Storington road, a short distance beyond Kingston Junction. It is one of the two last remaining toll gates leading to the city. Two months ago, the county council purchased the last toll road in Frontenac from the Kingston and Storington Road company, of which W. J. Fair, of Kingston, was president, for \$12,880, and on December 31st, 1910, the last tolls on Frontenac roads were collected. On Monday afternoon next, Reeve A. M. Rankin, of Kingston township, will sell by auction the two toll houses on the Storington road. The above picture shows the toll gate just beyond the city limits, and which had to be passed en route to Kingston Mills and Sunbury. The old portion of the toll house was erected about sixty years ago.

ANNUAL REPORT

The Late Mrs. Margaret Perie Walker.

At Enterprise, on January 3rd, Margaret Perie Walker, a well-known and much esteemed resident of that village, passed away. Deceased suffered a paralytic stroke about seven years ago, and had been failing slowly for some time, and had suffered greatly from bronchitis the last few months, but the end was peace. She fell asleep in Jesus, in whom she always placed her trust. FEWER PAUPERS IN LONDON.

Old Age Pensioners Said to Explain Decrease Last Year.

There were 11,985 fewer paupers in London on January 7th than on the corresponding day of 1910. The official return in which the figures are given attributes the decrease mainly to the removal of the pauper disqualification for old age pensions, but it is due also in a certain measure to the already existing pensions and to the improved economic conditions, which have been telling on the pauperism statistics for some months. Thus on December 31st, 1910, there were 1,436 fewer paupers in London than on the corresponding day of 1909. Those receiving outdoor relief have benefited to a greater extent than the inmates of institutions by the grant of old-age pensions.
