BETTER TRAINED MEN ARE NEEDED FOR THE WORK OF MINISTRY.

Stirring Appeal Made for Higher Education by Rev. J. W. Graham, D.D., General Secretary of Education—Preached at Sydenham Street Church on Sunday.

"I am pleading for trained men. We need better trained men for the ministry. This is the demand made upon us. God must have good men to work with."

Rev. J. W. Graham, D.D., general secretary of education, preached at both services in Sydenham Street Methodist church, on Sunday, and at the morning service it was indeed a stirring appeal which he made on behalf of the educational work of the church. He pleaded for more financial assistance, and at the close of the service the congregation was asked to give for this worthy cause.

Mr. Graham dealt with the educational work, in an interesting way, giving plain facts and figures, and using strong arguments to back up the work. The keynote of his sermon, or perhaps it might better be termed an address, was that of an appeal for higher education. The educational work, he pointed out, should be popularized. Subscriptions for this work should be secured from the masses.

Reference was made to the amounts which had been received for the work in the past. Some had an idea that in giving to this work they were giving to a small thing; this was not so, as it was a big thing. The work was progressing, and still greater results were being looked forward to.

The speaker emphasized the fact that the great need of today was that of trained men. Such high and responsible work demanded the highest possible qualifications. In the west, where there was great need for men, the cry was for men for leadership. Men were needed for these fields, who would be leaders of men. Men were needed who could organize. No good would be accomplished by sending out men who could not act as leaders. Some people had an idea that any man, who had the desire for the work could serve as a missionary. It was his opinion that the men did not need to go to college before taking up the work. This was indeed, a great mistake. The whole situation could be best sized up in the statement of Dr. Hammel, who knew of the work in Japan, when he said: "Send out the very best teachers and preachers you have for the work."

In the west, the cry which went out to use a common expression, was: "Don't send us out the culls." The demand was for trained men. There was great demand for religious education. We would get out of education just what we put into it. The responsibility for this higher educational work rested upon the church.

At St. James' Church.
Rev. W. H. Griffith Thomas, D.D., of Wycliffe College, Toronto, occupied the pulpit in St. James' church, Sunday morning, speaking from Genesis, xlviii. 12. "And he dreamed and behold a ladder was ascending and descending upon it." The speaker referred to the strides which have been made in recent years which have added materially to man's comfort, permitting him to travel quickly from place to place with great ease, and also to communicate with friends at the farthest ends of the earth. These advances have added a great deal to man's welfare physically, but they have not added to his spiritual welfare. Why? The answer is given in the text. There must be a connecting link between God and man for the human beings on this earth to keep in touch with him. From Genesis to Revelations is shown the separating character and power of sin and it needs something like a ladder to keep our feet upon the rock. Men in this generation are trying to build ladders for themselves. Some think that an orthodox religion will get them through the petty gates, others depend upon morality and a righteous life to squeeze them through, but just as surely as a man five foot eleven and one-half inches would be rejected by a company that is being formed of six-foot men, just as surely will those men fail in reaching heaven. Many men compare themselves with those who profess to be Christians and say to themselves that they are quite as good as their neighbors. The real comparison is not between us and our neighbors but between ourselves and Christ.

The speaker concluded a very eloquent discourse by saying that the only ladder between earth and heaven was Jesus Christ, and only by Him and through Him, are we enabled to enter the place prepared for the true and good.

Of Sixteen Thousand, Philadelphia Brides 11,000 are Light Haired.

Blondes in Philadelphia have just three times as many chances to be married as have brunettes, according to the records kept at the license bureau. During the last year the clerks have kept careful tab on the complexion of women applicants for licenses, and to-day Robert E. Ferguson, chief clerk, announced that out of 16,000 couples applying for licenses in at least 11,000 cases the women had light hair.

What Railroads Spend.
The greatest customers of the mills and factories are the railroads. The decision of that electorate, instead of being merely an expression of the wish of the people—as in the Ross referendum on prohibition in Ontario—of its own act, of legislation, and the legislature has nothing to do but to provide means for its enforcement.
